The following are fiction books; some are part of a series.

Pearl River Series by Patricia Bradley

<u>Deadly Revenge</u> – After returning home to Pearl Springs, Jenna Hart didn't expect her new job as deputy to bring her in contact again with FBI Agent Max Anderson. They team up to stop a killer on a path of revenge – only to have the tables turned on them when the hunted becomes the hunter. (This is the third book in the series; the other books are Counter Attack and Fatal Witness.)

The Matchmakers Series by Jen Turano

<u>To Spark a Match</u> – Miss Adelaide Duveen has resigned herself to the notion that she's destined to remain a spinster forever – a rather dismal prospect, but one that will allow her to concentrate on her darling cats and books. However, when she inadvertently stumbles upon Mr. Gideon Abbott engaged in a clandestine activity during a dinner party, Adelaide finds herself thrust into a world of intrigue that resembles the plots in the spy novels she devours. Former intelligence agent Gideon Abbott feels responsible for Adelaide after society threatens to banish her because of the distraction she caused to save his case. Hoping to return the favor, he turns to a good friend – and one of high society's leaders – to take Adelaide in hand and turn her fashionable. (This is the second book in the series; the first book is A Match in the Making.)

Alaskan Cyber Hunters Series by Kimberley Woodhouse

<u>70 North</u> – The Cyber Solutions team has managed to stay one step ahead of the madman who has killed so many, stopping him before reaching his ultimate goals, they matched wits with the killer and won in the end. CWS Emergency Clean-Up Buckets

January and February are the months Free Spring collects supplies for CWS Emergency Clean-Up Buckets.



A list of the supplies needed to complete one Bucket is below. Items may be placed in or beside the CWS chest in the narthex.

You may donate an item on the list or donate financially to enable bucket items to be purchased by Witness Commission. We will be assembling buckets at the end of February. Thank you!

- One 5-gallon bucket with resealable lid (If reused, please scrub clean.
 Do not use a bucket that has held chemicals of any kind. No screw lid.
 Advertisement on the outside is acceptable.)
- One 4-8 oz pump spray air freshener
- Five scouring pads (No stainless steel or pads with soap in them. Remove from packaging.)
- Seven sponges, including one large
- One scrub brush (with or without handle)
- 18 reusable, lightweight, multipurpose, dry, cleaning towels (No terrycloth, microfiber, or paper towels. Remove from packaging.)
- One 32-64 oz or two 25 oz bottle(s) of liquid laundry detergent
- One 16-34 oz bottle of liquid disinfectant dish soap
- One 12-40 oz bottle of liquid concentrate household cleaner that can be mixed with water (no spray bottles)
- One package of 36-50 clothespins
- One 50-100 ft clothesline (cotton or plastic line)
- Five dust masks (N95 particulate respirator dust masks preferred; no surgical masks)
- Twp pairs heavy-duty, waterproof, dishwashing gloves (Latex-free, non-surgical. Durable for multiple-use. Remove from packaging.)
- One pair of work gloves (cotton with leather palm or all leather)
- 20-28 heavy-duty or contractor-type 30-45 gallon trash bags on a roll (remove from packaging)
- One 6-9 oz bottle non-aerosol insect repellant (Pump spray bottles must have protective covers. Packs of 10-20 insect repellent wipes are also acceptable.)

All cleaning items must be new and all liquid items must be capped and securely tightened. Place all items into the bucket, making sure they are packed securely to avoid damage during shipment. Snap the lid on tight and seal with packing tape.
