

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As I prepare to go to North Carolina for our Annual Conference, the thought often enters my mind that it would be better to spend my time on Disaster Response than sitting in some of those upcoming business sessions. The historic disaster that was experienced by

the people in western North Carolina and other states was as Andy Hamilton says, "both frightening and faith-building." He wrote an excellent article for the April issue of *Messenger*, entitled, *When Our Rivers Overflow*.

I would share just one paragraph that reminds us of the importance of caring for our neighbors near and far:

"After the flood, I found myself in a vulnerable place. My family suffered some loss, but not nearly as much as our neighbors. We set out to help them in any way that we could. Yet we, too, were in need. Here in this space of vulnerability and loss, I was reminded how fragile life is. It was also here that I rediscovered the generosity of God's love. It was not about things, but presence. While my mind was still focused on self-preservation and the well-being of my immediate family, I began receiving emails and phone calls from around the country asking how we were coping and how they could help. In that space, the things of this world that divide us were washed away. Caring for our neighbors, their survival and recovery, became our priority. Suddenly the ties that bind us became apparent as the offers of mutual aid were extended."

I have emphasized that next to last line because it shouldn't take a disaster to heighten our awareness, but that is our human nature. I pray that you are not too busy to help when you see the need near and far, and I also pray that you are not too proud to accept help when you are in need.

Free Spring Library News

The following are fiction books; all are part of a series.

Gossamer Falls Series by Lynn H. Blackburn

Break my Fall – Dr. Meredith Quinn always planned to return to Gossamer Falls to practice dentistry and offer clinics to underserved areas. However, these areas are known for drug trafficking, and Police Chief Grayson Ward suspects local law enforcement is turning a blind eye. Grayson, having closed off his heart after too many losses, finds himself vulnerable when Meredith enters his life. To keep her safe, he must keep her close, making it impossible for him to retreat emotionally. Will she help him emerge from isolation, or will she leave him shattered? (This is the second book in the series; the first book is Never Fall Again.)

Tupelo Grove Series by Colleen Coble

Where Secrets Lie – College professor Savannah Webster is ready to give her ex-husband, Hez, another chance, and she believes he's finally ready for them to face their many past trials as a team. But when Savannah finds evidence that points to Hez's old demons resurfacing, the fragile trust they've built begins to crumble. And it's not just their relationship hanging in the balance – the survival of the university Savannah's family poured their lives into is also under threat. (This is the second book in the series; the first book is: What We Hide.)

Hidden Bay Series by Elizabeth Goddard

Storm Warning – Haunted by a past she can't remember, Remi Grant takes a job at an isolated storm-watching lodge on the rocky Washington coast. Former military pilot Hawk Beckett arrives to clear his head after a personal mission cost him his job. But danger lurks at the lodge – and the final and fiercest storm has yet to come. (This is the first book in the series.)

Summer Harbor Series by Denise Hunter

<u>Falling Like Snowflakes</u> – Eden Martelli is on the run with her five-year-old son from the people she thought would protect them. Her car breaks down and leaves her stranded in Summer Harbor Maine with hardly any money. She must find work. Beau Callahan is a former sheriff's deputy who is working full-time on the family's Christmas tree farm after the death of his parents. At the same time his aunt suffers a fall that will need someone to stay with her, Eden shows up looking for work. His years in law enforcement have him sensing that Eden, or "Kate" as she calls herself, is hiding something. Will Beau understand, when her past catches up with

her? (This is the first book in the series.)

Erin Delaney Mysteries Series by Nancy Mehl

<u>Shattered Sanctuary</u> – After tragedy upended ex-police officer and bestselling author Erin Delaney's life, she finds solace in a cabin nestled in the Smoky Mountains. One night her newfound peace is shattered by cries in the night. Teaming up with the handsome local police chief, Erin is thrust into stopping a merciless serial killer while confronting the ghosts of her past. (This is the first book in the series.)

Hope of Cheyenne Series by Tracie Peterson

<u>A Constant Love</u> – After a vicious winter in Cheyenne, Wyoming, claims the lives of their loved ones, Charlotte Aldrich and Micah Hamilton are trying to bring their ranches -- and their hearts -- back to life. But as love grows, the secrets they're keeping may pull them apart forever, and they must rely on faith to forge a future built on love, healing, and hope. (This is the first book in the series.)

Blue Sky Hill Series by Lisa Wingate

<u>A Month of Summer</u> – Rebecca Macklin returns home when her aging father is found wandering the streets alone and his wife becomes ill. When Hanna Beth Parker hears of her estranged stepdaughter's arrival, she realizes that the last person she'd ever ask for help is the only one she can count on. A story of betrayal – and forgiveness.

Free Spring Medical Equipment Loaners

Did you ever need a pair of crutches, a cane, or a wheel chair for just a few days? You might not have known that Free Spring has a closet full of medical equipment under the stairs in the old fellowship hall – wheelchairs, shower chairs, commode stabilizer,

bedside commodes, metal crutches, canes, walkers, grabbers, etc.. This equipment is there to be borrowed by any Free Springer, or your family, or friends.

Check out the display of equipment in the fellowship hall during July. At the end of July, they will be placed back in the closet. You may borrow this equipment at any time. Just choose what you need and sign it out on the clipboard. Keep it as long as you need it, and then cross your name off when you return it. From the memorial money for Joe Ritzman (who borrowed some of the Free Spring equipment), two hundred dollars was used to fill in any gaps of equipment. If you have any questions, ask Sharon Ritzman.

The wheelchairs, which are near the upstairs entrance and in the fellowship hall, are to remain there for use during the Sunday school and worship hours.
