

Greetings Southern Pennsylvania District in the Name of Christ!

I hear you are preparing for a District Conference. I hope your Conference will feature enriching times of worship, spiritual growth, and fellowship (while including as little tedium, and acrimony as humanly possible). Along with many faithful co-laborers, I'm working on a conference too, and I have some of these same modest hopes for the 2026 Annual Conference.

Lord willing, we will meet as a church from June 28 to July 2 in Fort Wayne, Indiana, for the 239th recorded Church of the Brethren Annual Conference. Instead of our more typical Wednesday-Sunday schedule, the 2026 event will run from Sunday evening through Thursday noon, and will include a mix of worship, business, learning, service, and fellowship.

I don't have a choice whether I will attend—that was pretty much settled when I accepted the call to serve as Moderator—but I recognize you do have a choice. I hope you'll choose to invest your time and resources in gathering with the larger church in Fort Wayne.

These are perilous times for the church. Cultural, theological, and political differences are severing the common bonds that once held us together. We have been fighting over some things for so long that it's hard to imagine it any other way. But imagine we must!

Scholar Walter Brueggeman in his classic work The Prophetic Imagination argued that the role of a prophet is to imagine new possibilities. Paradoxically, Brueggeman suggested that a prophet's visions and dreams for a hopeful future often reappropriate themes and symbols from the past—a newness that is so old, he wrote, that it has been forgotten.

If we were to rummage through our collective attic, I wonder what forgotten spiritual treasures we Brethren might rediscover that could help us imagine something new. Who threw that old sheet over the theme of radical discipleship? How did all that dust accumulate on the Book we say is our creed? How did caring community, humble service, and nonviolent peacemaking get buried in that cardboard box full of old Christmas decorations?

Next summer is still a long way off, so I'm not entirely sure how the 2026 Conference will come together. But I can imagine we will look back to see if we can rediscover anything that will help us move forward as a more faithful and united church. Whether you are a Conference junkie who remembers the location and Moderator of every Big Meeting since 1958 or you have never attended, I hope to see you in Fort Wayne. It's an important time for the church to be together.

It is an honor to write to you on behalf of the staff, volunteers, and the Mission and Ministry Board of the Church of the Brethren. We are renewing our efforts to connect with district executives to better understand the needs of congregations and their leaders. We are also seeking ways and opportunities to engage with congregations, encouraging our members to consider participating in our service ministries, and collaborate with us in our global partnerships. We believe this support is essential in fulfilling our vision to be and encounter Jesus in our neighborhoods. To that end, we are here to serve, so if you have any questions or needs, please let us know.

Interim District Executive's

Report to the 2025 Southern PA District Conference SOUTHERN PA DISTRICT CHURCH of the BRETHREN Interim District Executive Report to the 2025 District Conference Delegates

Greetings from the Southern PA District Office. The six months to which I agreed to serve as your Interim District Executive back in October of 2023, is in the past as now 27 congregations within this District continue to work at living out Christ's instructions to His disciples as noted in Matthew. Some churches believe that mission trips to other areas is the way to serve while other congregations work within their own communities. Your District, as a whole, ministers through its District Board and Commissions, as your District staff works/ministers while serving the board and the District congregations. Albeit that service is done a bit differently and in a different time table than in past years.

As you read the reports from our Ministry, Nurture Witness and Stewards Commissions, you will see how each of these commissions work to reach out in ministry thru their responsibilities. While reading these Commission reports, consider what ministry is accomplished even though that ministry is a bit different than going on a disaster project or to another country to introduce persons to Jesus. My appreciation goes out to those District Board persons who provide our District with their outreach and service.

As I reflect on my ministry/leadership to the District since the 2024 District Conference, much of it has been providing direction and guidance to the four District Commissions, the District Board and ministerial matters. I have also worked with the Susquehanna Valley Ministry Center, (SVMC) who provides educational opportunities to our District ministers and leaders and who has begun some discussion on the potential to provide educational opportunities to the laity of our congregations. Church leaders who have any interest in receiving educational opportunities for lay persons, should give the District Executive of SVMC a phone call as this avenue is being discussed.

Certainly, COVID and staffing changes have changed the connectedness of the District, its congregations and our District Agencies over the past several years. An effort is being cultivated to bring back some of that lost connectedness with our District and our District agencies. This is an opportune time for such action, as new District agency leadership has come into place over the past year and we examine how our congregations can remain connected or find new avenues of connection.

As Southern PA District has become much smaller because of the loss of congregations over the past number of years, District leadership faces difficult times in how to accomplish ministry and be the church community SOPA was in the past. However, recently, while attending one of our smaller congregations for an ordination service, there was an air of joy in that small body of believers, as they exhibited excitement about being a church family. That kind of an air brings in new persons and new possibilities. Although "small" may be a more difficult path, never forget the old saying that, "Good things come in small packages."

As I prepare this report, our District has licensed (3) persons {Eric Seibert, Josh Tomes, Larry Swartz} and ordained (2) persons (Ian Irvin, Paul Swope,) since our 2024 District Conference. At this writing, there are persons who are either in the discerning mode or considering same. That is a positive note for our District and for God's church!

Changes in District staffing has recently occurred in that District Treasurer, H. Roger Miller, Jr. passed on to his Heavenly home following a round with cancer. We extend our sympathy to the Miller Family for their loss of husband, father and grandfather. In the meantime, the District Board

affirmed Jay Finkenbinder, Jr. as Interim District Treasurer. Another change that recently occurred was for the District's Bookkeeper, Annette Boyer, to submit her retirement. Our thanks to Sister Annette for the many years of Bookkeeping/Accounting expertise she provided to Southern Pa District Office. Brother Jay Finkenbinder, who had expressed his interest to help, indicated his willingness to assume the position of District Bookkeeper.

Another joy-filled moment this year was the placement of a Pastoral Team at the Gettysburg congregation. After a year of a part-time Intentional Interim Pastoral Team at the Gettysburg Congregation, the congregation called Ian Irvin, Larry Swartz and Don Hubbell as their Settled Pastoral Team. Each member of this Settled Team is part time, while together, providing leadership to the Gettysburg congregation.

The Knobsville congregation, thru the leadership of their Pastor Robert Bilger, now has a Sister congregation from the Middle PA District. This past summer the Valley Point Congregation from Middle PA District, and the Knobsville Church of the Brethren came together with District leadership from both Districts to consider the possibility of Pastor Bilger serving as pastor to both these congregations. After a meeting of both congregations and Districts, it was agreed for Brother Bilger to serve as part time pastor to the two congregations with the possibilities of determining how the two congregations might do some special services together. Recently, they had a joint picnic at Cowan's Gap. Both congregations have indicated an appreciation to be able to have services via Brother Bilger's pastoral leadership.

With 2025 being the year for COB ordained ministers to process through the five year re-ordination, all active ordained ministers will need to meet certain requirements as that re-ordination certification will take place this Fall. One of the important things that the District Ministry Commission needs to process is the need for current background checks for ordained persons to be on file in the District Office, the completion of the denominational ethics course, as well as reviewing continuation education units. The work of following up on these certifications is the responsibility of the District Executive and the District Ministry Commission. We are most appreciative of each ordained person for their cooperation in this five-year renewal process for our ordained persons.

An additional positive activity for Southern Pa District was the recent Summer Picnic arranged by our District Witness Commission held at Little Buffalo State Park. Being what we believe to be the first District Picnic for Southern PA District, it was a nice (amid the very warm humid day) time for all who attended. This was a good way to come together for a time of worship and enjoyment of one another.

In Grace Elliott's recent article from Africa, Grace quotes the following from I Timothy 4: 12"Don't let anyone despise your youth, but set an example for the believers in speech, in conduct, in love, in faith, and in purity. This text indicates youth setting an example...In these times, my encouragement for each of us, regardless of age or position in life, is to set a Christ-like example---WE NEED TO SET SOME GOOD EXAMPLES if we are to Walk With Boldness and truly be the Church..." Thank You" for striving towards those Goals."

Our text this year comes from Hebrews 4:14-16: "14 Seeing then that we have a great High Priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus the Son of God, let us hold fast our confession. 15 For we do not have a High Priest who cannot sympathize with our weaknesses, but was in all points tempted as we are, yet without sin. 16 Let us therefore come boldly to the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy and find grace to help in time of need." (NKJV). I believe that these words are specifically applicable to prayer. As we come boldly to our great High Priest, we will receive what we need, and we will deepen our relationship with our Savior and Lord.

Instead of a preaching time, we will spend intentional time coming to the throne of grace in prayer. On Saturday we will have a Love Feast service in place of insight sessions. We hope this will be a meaningful time of connection and worship.

Parliamentary Procedures in Brief and Rules of the Meeting

Parliamentary Procedures in Brief

In order that the delegate body may participate readily in the parliamentary aspects of the business sessions, the following summary of the more common kinds of action may be helpful.

- I. When you want to bring before the Conference for its consideration a particular subject or item of business:
- a. The proper motion is **Main Motion** A **Main Motion** requires a second, is debatable, is amendable, and requires a majority vote to pass (or two-thirds vote if previously agreed on by Conference action).
- b. Form: "I move that ..." or "I move the adoption (acceptance, approval) of this report."
- II. When you want to modify or in some way appropriately dispose of a matter of business, you may: (motions listed in ascending order of precedence)
 - a. **Move to lay on the table, or take from the table** (second, not debatable, not amendable, simple majority).
- i. Object: To lay aside business in such a manner that its consideration may be renewed later.
- ii. Form: "I move that this matter be laid on the table" or "I move to take from the table..."
 - b. Move the previous question (second, not debatable, not amendable, two-thirds vote required).
- i. Object: To stop debate on the immediately pending question.
- ii. Form: "I move the previous question."

Please note that merely calling "question" from the floor is not the same as a motion for the previous question, and does not obligate the Moderator to take a vote.

- c. Move to postpone to a set time (second, debatable, amendable, simple majority).
- i. Object: Unlike tabling, the business is considered at a later time without needing to be "taken from the table."
- ii. Form: "I move that this matter be postponed to..."
 - d. Move to commit, refer, or recommit (second, debatable, amendable, simple majority).
- i. *Object:* To place the business in the hands of a few for later reporting to the Conference (for major changes).
- ii. Form: "I move that this matter be referred to a committee of ... to be named by ... with instruction..."
 - e. Move to amend (second, debatable, amendable, simple majority).
- i. Object: To change or modify, to "amend" (for minor changes).
- 1) Form: "I move to amend the motion by striking out..."
- 2) Form: "I move to amend the motion by inserting ... between ... and ..."
- 3) Form: "I move to amend the motion by adding ... after ..."
- 4) Form: "I move to amend the motion by striking out ... and inserting ..."
- 5) Form: "I move to amend the motion by striking out ... and substituting this (read or share the substitution)."
- 6) When you want to take an action governing the conduct of business, you may introduce: **Privileged and incidental motions** motions that take precedence over any pending question although not related to that question (not debatable).
- 1) Move to adjourn or recess.

- a. Object: To dismiss a meeting or to provide or an intermission.
- b. Form: "I move that we adjourn (recess while ... or until ...)."
- 2) Raise a question of privilege.
- a. *Object:* To get the attention of the Moderator at once, to ask a question, or to attend to some matter that cannot wait.
- b. Form: "I rise to a question of privilege."
- 3) Rise to a point of order.
- a. Object: To raise the question as to whether there has been a breach of order.
- b. Form: "I rise to a point or order ..."

Rules of the Meeting

- 1) All questions, with their answers, for discussion shall be read by the Clerk, after which the Moderator shall declare same the business of the meeting.
- 2) No one shall speak more than twice on the same question. The first speech shall be limited to three minutes and the second speech to two minutes.
- 3) The Moderator shall decide when a question shall be put to passage, but anyone from the voting body may move the "previous question."
- 4) All appeals from the ruling of the Moderator shall be decided by the voting body.
- 5) The **Worshipful Work process** will be interspersed with parliamentary Procedures as we process the various business items and ministry shared during this District Conference.
- 6) The ballot is prepared by the Nominating & Personnel Committee and is submitted to the District Board for approval after which it becomes the ballot of the District Conference. All elections by the District Conference shall be by majority vote.
- 7) All queries and business for the District Conference must come through the District Board.



RESOLUTIONS OF THE SOUTHERN DISTRICT OF PENNSYLVANIA – CHURCH OF THE BRETHREN

WHEREAS, the Southern District of Pennsylvania – Church of the Brethren ("SOPA") is a territorial subdivision of the Church of the Brethren (the "Church"), which was formed from a group of congregations in geographic proximity with both a common purpose and mission, brought together and formed as a Pennsylvania nonprofit corporation, which charitable purposes are to promote, supervise and carry out the programs, ministries, and mission of the Church within the Pennsylvania counties of York, Adams, Franklin, Fulton, Cumberland, Perry, Juniata, Snyder and Union; and

WHEREAS, the Brethren Home Foundation, a Pennsylvania nonprofit corporation (the "Foundation"), is a SOPA mission agency with attendant responsibilities and reporting requirements in accordance with SOPA's Amended and Restated Bylaws; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Foundation's Articles of Incorporation (the "Foundation's Articles"), the Foundation's members shall be the members of churches of the Church who belong to SOPA and are in good standing as reflected on SOPA's membership rolls (collectively, the "Members"); and

WHEREAS, the Members exercise their right to vote on the business and affairs of the Foundation through duly elected delegates to SOPA; and

WHEREAS, the Foundation's Articles currently provide that SOPA has a secondary interest in the assets and property of the Foundation in the event of the Foundation's dissolution; and

WHEREAS, the Foundation's bylaws currently require representation by at least five Members on the Foundation's Board of Directors; and

WHEREAS, over time such legal connections between SOPA and the Foundation have increased the economic risk and exposure to each organization and their affiliated constituencies;

WHEREAS, to mitigate such risks the Foundation's Board of Directors has discerned through strategic planning that changes and enhancements to its governance structure in which the Foundation is no longer controlled by the Members is the appropriate governance model for the future, while at the same time reinforcing the Foundation's and its affiliate's dedication to its Church heritage, traditions, teachings and values, will mitigate risks of liability extending to SOPA, and will better align with the Foundation's charitable mission and long-term initiatives and objectives; and

WHEREAS, any amendments, alterations, or revisions to the Foundation's Articles require the approval of two-thirds of the Members; and

WHEREAS the Foundation requests the consent of the Members to amend and restate the Foundation's Articles (as set forth in Exhibit "A," attached hereto), and to end its formal relationship with SOPA as a mission agency, and to relinquish any rights and privileges associated therewith, so that the Foundation may restructure its overall corporate governance model in order

to protect both the Foundation and SOPA from potential legal exposure arising from the activities of each organization; and

WHEREAS, in furtherance of the above, the Foundation believes it is in the mutual interests of the Foundation and SOPA to rearticulate and clarify their relationship as proposed in the Statement of Covenant Relationship attached hereto as Exhibit "B" (the "Statement"), which will preserve the long-standing relationship of mutual cooperation, respect and purpose between the District and the Foundation while enabling the Foundation to become an independent nonprofit corporation and to restructure its legal relationship with its affiliate, The Brethren Home Community, a Pennsylvania nonprofit corporation (the "Community"), by forming a new parent entity, thus enabling the Foundation and the Community to further and better serve their charitable purposes and missions; and

WHEREAS, the Foundation has expressed its commitment to the Statement in order to enhance the lives and holistic growth of the older persons it serves, in keeping with the teachings and traditions of SOPA and the Church.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that SOPA, by and through its Members, who are represented in turn by each Member's delegate, hereby approve the amendments to the Foundation's Articles as reflected in Exhibit "A" to allow the Foundation to become an independent corporation no longer directly controlled by the Members; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Members approve amending SOPA's Amended and Restated Bylaws such that the Foundation shall no longer be a Mission Agency directly affiliated with the District and the Foundation shall no longer be subject to those duties and responsibilities owed to the District and a Mission Agency; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the District, hereby approves and adopts the Statement, which sets forth the elements of an enduring partnership and voluntary relationship important to each organization, and commits to the Statement as a continued opportunity to have a positive influence in the lives of older adults by fostering core Church values to those persons; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that these Resolutions shall take effect as of January 1, 2026.

EXHIBIT "A" THE BRETHREN HOME FOUNDATION AMENDED AND RESTATED ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

EXHIBIT A

AMENDED AND RESTATED ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF

THE BRETHREN HOME FOUNDATION (a Pennsylvania nonprofit corporation)

- 1) The name of the corporation shall be The Brethren Home Foundation.
- The registered office of the corporation is 2990 Carlisle Pike, P.O. Box 128, New Oxford, Adams County, PA 17350.
- 3) The purposes of the corporation are as follows:
 - a) To carry out such activities which raise funds from grants, contributions, bequests and devises for the development of and for the funding of organizations which provide and/or support:
 - retirement facilities with nursing care services and spiritual influences for aging persons;
 - ii) educational activities related to the care of sick and injured persons, particularly the elderly, or to the promotion of health; and
 - activities designed and carried on to promote the general health or welfare of the elderly.
 - b) To engage in and conduct charitable, educational, and scientific activities, and to further such activities through the support and benefit of The Brethren Home and other specified organizations described in Section 509(a)(1) or Section 509(a)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code;
 - To coordinate and support the activities and policies of The Brethren Home and other specified organizations described in Section 509(a)(1) or Section 509(a)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code;
 - d) To take such actions and to perform such acts to accomplish its purposes with all the powers conferred on non-profit corporations by the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, subject to limitations imposed on its actions under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code;
 - e) To carry on any lawful activities in furtherance of the foregoing purposes, subject to limitations imposed on its actions under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.
- 4) The corporation does not contemplate pecuniary gain or profit, incidental or otherwise.

- 5) The term for which the corporation is to exist is perpetual.
- 6) The corporation is organized on a non-stock basis.
- 7) The corporation shall have no members..
- 8) This corporation shall be operated exclusively for charitable, scientific and educational purposes within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. No member or director of the corporation shall possess any right or title to or interest in the corporate property or earnings of the corporation in his or her individual or private capacity and no part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of any member, director, officer or any private shareholder or individual. No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall consist of carrying on propaganda or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, nor shall the corporation participate in or intervene in any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office.
- 9) Any references herein to specific provisions of the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania or to specific provisions of the Internal Revenue Code shall be construed to include subsequent amendments to such specific provisions and to include corresponding provisions of subsequent legislation which may restate, supersede, or otherwise alter such specific provisions.
- 10) Upon dissolution of the corporation, any property after providing for debts and obligations of the corporation shall be distributed to The Brethren Home Community, a Pennsylvania non-stock, non-profit corporation, or its successor, provided that such corporation or its successor is then in existence and is then exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. If upon the dissolution of the corporation, The Brethren Home Community or its successor, is not in existence, or is not then an organization described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, any property of the corporation remaining after providing for debts and obligations of the corporation shall be distributed to one of more organizations exempt from income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as may be designated by the Board of Directors of the corporation.

STATEMENT OF COVENANT RELATIONSHIP

THIS STATEMENT OF COVENANT RELATIONSHIP is made and entered into as of the 1st day of January, 2026 by and among SOUTHERN DISTRICT OF PENNSYLVANIA - CHURCH OF THE BRETHREN, a Pennsylvania nonprofit corporation (the "District"), THE BRETHREN HOME FOUNDATION, a Pennsylvania nonprofit corporation (the "Foundation"), and THE BRETHREN HOME COMMUNITY, a Pennsylvania nonprofit corporation (the "Community").

PRELIMINARY STATEMENT

WHEREAS, the mission of The Church of the Brethren (the "Church") is set forth in the Great Commission of the Lord, to nurture the growth of the members of the Church and make known the salvation of God through His Son Jesus Christ and to be related as God's instrument to the problems and needs of the world; and

WHEREAS, the District is a territorial subdivision of the Church of the Brethren (the "Church") formed from a group of congregations in geographic proximity with both common purpose and mission, in mutuality brought together and formed as a Pennsylvania nonprofit corporation, which charitable purposes are to promote, supervise and carry out the programs, ministries, and mission of the Church of the Brethren (the "Church") within the counties of York, Adams, Franklin, Fulton, Cumberland, Perry, Juniata, Snyder and Union, Pennsylvania, and such other territory as may become a part of the Southern District of Pennsylvania; and

WHEREAS, the Foundation is recognized by the Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") as an organization exempt from federal income taxation as a charitable organization under the provisions of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended (the "Code"); and

WHEREAS, the Community is recognized by the IRS as a Section 501(c)(3) charitable organization exempt from taxation under the Internal Revenue Code (the "Code").

WHEREAS, the Foundation is the parent corporation of the Community, which is recognized by the IRS as an organization exempt from federal income taxation as a charitable organization under the provisions of Section 501(c)(3) of the Code; and

WHEREAS, the Community was formed for the charitable purposes of providing housing, healthcare and related care and supportive services to benefit and support elderly persons; and

WHEREAS, the Foundation was formed to raise and receive funds from grants, contributions, and other charitable gifts and donations which support retirement facilities, including the Community; and

WHEREAS, the District, in accordance with the teachings and values of community and service, has a history of Christian responsibility and caring for one another, and the wider family of

God, through its service to people through the arm of its mission agencies, including the Foundation; and

WHEREAS, the District and the Church recognize the importance of operating, maintaining and protecting and promoting the mission agencies as a vital means of carrying out the Christian mission and institutional ministries of the District and the Church. The health and welfare ministries embraced within this Christian mission include, but are not limited to, services in the areas of care and support for the elderly, including those charitable ministries of the Foundation, and its subsidiary, the Community; and

WHEREAS the Foundation is currently a mission agency of the District, for which the members of the Church congregations in good standing residing within the District serve as the governing members of the Foundation (collectively, the "Members") and the Members exercise their right to vote on the business and affairs of the Foundation through duly elected delegates to the District; and

WHEREAS, the Foundation and the District have discussed the Foundation's and the Community's desire to implement a strategic plan and corporate restructuring which will foster organizational growth, achieve operational efficiencies, better position the Foundation and the Community to fulfill their respective charitable purposes, and permit the nonprofit corporate system to expand its programs and services lines to benefit and support the elderly in need; and more efficiently meet and achieve long term initiatives and objectives; and

WHEREAS, the Foundation and District recognize the inherent liability risks to the District associated with the District Members control over the Foundation and the potential increased risks associated with the Foundation's contemplated strategic plan and corporate restructuring; and

WHEREAS, the Church, the District, the Foundation and the Community share a common interest that health and welfare ministries bearing the name of the Church of the Brethren shall be demonstrably caring, quality missions of Christian service that operate in a manner consistent with the principles of teachings of our Lord; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of District, the Foundation and the Community to rearticulate and clarify its statement of the relationship between the District and the Foundation which both honors the rich heritage of the Church, its relationship with and faithful support of the Foundation, and the cooperative ministry between them, but also acknowledges the legal prudence and accepts the operational necessity for the independence of the Foundation moving forward.

NOW THEREFORE, the District, the Foundation and the Community covenant and agree that this Statement of Covenant Relationship, including its Preliminary Statement and its Covenants is an accurate statement of the relationship among the District, the Foundation and the Community, and the parties hereby covenant and agree as follows:

- 1. Although the District, the Foundation and the Community share a common interest in carrying out the Christian mission of the Church and in the charitable purposes of the Foundation and the Community, the District, the Foundation and the Community recognize each other as independent legal entities. Each organization is incorporated separately and has its own governing board. Neither is owned by the others nor is either the partner or agent of the others. Each organization holds no legal right, title, or equitable interest in any property, including real, personal or intangible property, or assets, of the other. Neither the District nor the Foundation nor the Community accepts any legal responsibility for the operations of the other. The District, the Foundation and the Community agree to hold each other harmless for any liabilities arising out of this Statement of Covenant Relationship.
- 2. The District agrees to relinquish all rights in or control of the Foundation as its member. The District agrees that its members of the churches which belong to the District shall no longer hold any rights as voting members on the Board of the Foundation, and the District shall have no further authority regarding the governance of or transactions involving the Foundation as set forth in Article I of the Bylaws of the Foundation. The District hereby consents, agrees, and approves to such amendments to the governance of the Foundation.
- 3. While the Foundation and the Community, through the programs and services which they provide, their history, charter and Bylaws, reflect a strong relationship with the District, the Foundation and the Community are solely responsible for making governance decisions affecting the purpose, mission, policies, administration, and corporate actions of each organization. The Foundation and the Community agree to receive nominations from the District for consideration of service on each organization's Board of Directors. As reflective of the ongoing relationship with the District and the Church, orientation for service on the respective Boards of the Foundation and Community shall include instruction on the Church's values and mission, as well as the Foundation's and Community's longstanding relationship with the District. At such times and as deemed appropriate by the Board of the Foundation and the Board of the Community, a designated appointee from the District may be invited to attend Board meetings of the Foundation and Community.
- 4. The District agrees to surrender any secondary legal right, title, or equitable interest in the any charitable assets or proceeds of the Foundation upon its dissolution, and hereby consents, agrees and approves to such surrender, as reflected in the proposed Amendments to the Articles of Incorporation of the Foundation, with such approval evidenced by its signature affixed hereto.
- 5. The District, on one hand, and the Foundation and the Community, on the other, are not contractually or legally obligated to any particular level or amount of financial support to the other. Neither the District nor the Foundation nor the Community accepts any financial

responsibility for the operations of the other. Neither party is obligated to provide financial support to the other, nor is there any guarantee that any financial support voluntarily provided will be continued. Any support that either organization does or may provide to the other is, and shall be, voluntary, as determined, from time to time, solely by each organization, as it deems appropriate and feasible.

- 6. The District has no authority to require the Foundation or the Community to assume any contractual, financial or other obligation; nor may the District accept or assume any such obligation in the name of the Foundation or the Community. Similarly, the Foundation and the Community have no authority to accept or assume any such obligation in the name of the District. The District, on one hand, and the Foundation and the Community, on the other, shall have no obligation or responsibility for or with respect to any contract, commitment or liability of the other organization.
- 7. The Foundation shall continue to fulfill its mission of offering quality services to and support for the elderly in a manner that recognizes and honors its heritage as a former mission agency of the District. The Foundation as well as the Community remain committed to the principles of service, humility, and fellowship that have defined its Christian mission of service and relationship with the District and the Church from their inception. It is the intent of the Foundation and Community to recognize this relationship to the District and to encourage the continued participation of its residents in the life of their local church and in the extended Christian community.
- 8. The Foundation shall no longer be a Mission Agency as defined by the District's Amended and Restated Bylaws and shall have no further responsibility or requirement to report to the District, submit organizational minutes, provide updated or revised organizational documents, or meet with the District to review the Foundation's programs and activities. The continued relationship between and among the parties shall be purely voluntary. The leadership of the Foundation and the Community, shall nonetheless:
 - a. endeavor to attend the District's Conference on an annual basis and provide updates similar to other Mission Agencies;
 - b. meet with church pastors in a single meeting on an annual basis;
 - c. attend a single meeting of the District's Executive Committee board annually; and
 - extend to the District and its administrative staff, adequate office space including two
 offices, meeting space, and storage as mutually agreed upon.
- 9. The District, the Foundation and the Community shall mutually cooperate with one another when feasible and as each organization deems appropriate to promote and advance those

shared missions and programs of the District, the Foundation and the Community which provide service and care those specific populations in need.

- 10. This statement affirms that the care of older adults in need and the education of persons who care for them is legitimate ministry of the District, and that the Foundation and Community continue to serve as an unaffiliated yet meaningful extension of that ministry to people of the District and to others in this geographical area. It further affirms a mutual, voluntary relationship among the District, the Foundation, and the Community having common purposes, goals, histories, and traditions. It affirms the Foundation's commitment to the ministry of Jesus Christ and of the Church. The Foundation and the Community may represent themselves to the public as an organization which subscribes to the ideals and practices of the District and the Church; however, any information or materials shall not state or imply that the District or the Church guarantees the financial obligations of the Foundation or any of its affiliated corporations.
- 11. The District, the Foundation and the Community shall endeavor to communicate with one another in a spirit of collaboration and shared purpose and with an open and regular interchange of information and ideas for the benefit, advancement, support, and enrichment and fulfillment of the lives of those persons they serve.
- 12. This Statement of Covenant Relationship shall be subject to review and amendment at such times and in such manner as may be mutually agreeable to the District, the Foundation and the Community.
- 13. This Statement of Covenant Relationship affirms the purely voluntary association of independent organizations, recognizing one another in good faith and trust through their common commitment and witness to Jesus Christ as Lord.
- 14. This Statement of Covenant Relationship supersedes any and all prior agreements, understandings, undertakings, or statements of relationship between the parties.

THE BRETHREN HOME FOUNDATION Parent Corporation AMENDED BYLAWS

ARTICLE I - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The Brethren Home Foundation (the "Corporation") shall have no members.

ARTICLE II - BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. The affairs of this Corporation shall be managed by a Board of Directors of not more than sixteen (16) directors. Included in this number shall be the President of the Corporation who shall serve as a director, ex officio, with vote. Excluding the President of the Corporation, the balance of the directors shall be elected by the directors then in office.

Section 2. The elected directors shall consist of three (3) classes with each class having five (5) elected directors. Terms of the fifteen elected directors will be staggered in three (3) year terms for all classes. The term of office of the directors shall begin at the first Board meeting of the Board following the annual meeting.

Section 3. The directors shall be natural persons of full age. Except as otherwise provided in this Section, no elected director shall be eligible for re-election after having served three (3) full three (3) year terms until one (1) year has elapsed after the expiration of his/her last term of office. Under unusual circumstances that have the potential to negatively affect the Corporation, the Board may elect a director to serve an additional term for a maximum of two (2) years, provided that the Board first determines that such an unusual circumstance exists and that the best interests of the Corporation will be served thereby.

<u>Section 4.</u> Directors, except the President (who shall be an employee of The Brethren Home Community), shall serve without compensation; but they shall be reimbursed for expenses reasonably incurred in the performance of their duties.

Section 5. In the event a vacancy occurs on the Board of Directors among the Directors elected by the Board of Directors by reasons of death, resignation, removal or disqualification, the remaining members of the Board of Directors shall elect a successor to serve for the balance of the unexpired term. A Director may be removed by the Board at any time with or without cause in accordance with Article IV, Section 6, and Article XI of these Bylaws. Failure to attend three (3) regularly scheduled consecutive meetings and failing to notify the President or Chair of such intended absences will automatically disqualify the Director and create a vacancy in his/her office; unless after consultation, such Director communicates with the Board Chair the reasons for absences and such is acceptable to the Board.

Section 6. Any Director may resign at any time by giving written notice to the Chair or the Secretary of the Corporation. Such resignation shall take effect on the date of the receipt of such notice or at any later time specified therein, and unless otherwise specified therein, the acceptance of such resignation shall not be necessary to make it effective.

ARTICLE III - OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers shall be Chair, Vice Chair, Secretary, Treasurer, and Assistant Secretary-Treasurer, all of whom shall be members of the Board of Directors. In addition to such officers, the President of The Brethren Home Community shall be the President of the Corporation as long as he/she continues to serve in the capacity of the President of The Brethren Home Community. The Board may elect other officers, who may but do not have to be members of the Board of Directors, such as Vice Presidents, and such other officers shall serve in such capacities as the Board may deem appropriate.

<u>Section 2.</u> The officers, Chair, Vice Chair, Secretary, Treasurer, and Assistant Secretary-Treasurer shall be elected annually by the Board of Directors for a term of one (1) year at the first meeting, to be known as organizational meeting, of the Board of Directors. An officer may be removed by the Board at any time with or without cause.

Section 3. The Chair of the Board shall be the presiding officer of this Corporation and shall preside at all meetings of the Corporation and the Board at which he/she is present. He/she may sign and execute all authorized bonds, agreements and other obligations in the name of the Corporation. Nothing herein shall preclude the Board of Directors from delegating the responsibility to execute bonds, agreements and other obligations in the name of the Corporation to the President or to such other Officers as it may deem appropriate. He/she shall have authority to appoint all ad hoc committees that may be determined to be necessary.

<u>Section 4.</u> In the absence, removal, disability or death of the Chair, the Vice Chair shall discharge the duties of the Chair until his/her return, or the disability is removed, or the vacancy is filled; and he/she shall perform such other duties as may be prescribed by the Board of Directors.

Section 5. The Secretary shall attend all meetings of the Board of Directors and keep, in suitable books, minutes of said meetings and have charge of the minutes and records so kept. He/She shall send out such notices as may be required by law or by these Bylaws to the Board of Directors and shall perform generally all duties incidental to the office of the Secretary.

Section 6. The Treasurer shall be the custodian of all securities and investments of the Corporation and shall deposit all investment income in such bank or banks as the Board of Directors shall authorize; he/she shall keep an accurate account of all monies received or payments made and render monthly reports as stated meetings of the Board of Directors and shall prepare an annual financial report verified by him/her as the Treasurer and by the Chair, or verified by a majority of the directors, which report shall contain such data as is required by the Nonprofit Corporation Law of 1988 of Pennsylvania and any amendments thereto.

Section 7. The President of The Brethren Home Community shall serve as the President and Chief Executive Officer of the Corporation and shall have the authority to supervise the administration of the Corporation and all of its activities and departments subject only to such policies as may be adopted in such orders as may be issued by the Board of Directors or by any of its committees to which it has delegated power for such action. He/she shall act as the duly authorized representative of the Board of Directors in all matters relating to operations for which the Board has not designated some other person for that specific purpose.

The authority and duties of the President shall be:

To carry out all policies established by the Board;

To perfect and submit to the Board for approval a plan of organization of personnel and others concerned with the operation of the Corporation;

To select, employ, control and discharge all employees;

To develop and maintain personnel policies and practices for the Corporation:

To see that all physical properties are kept in good state of repair and operating condition;

To supervise all business affairs, handle all operational funds and to insure that all funds are collected and expended to the best possible advantage;

To submit regularly to the Board of Directors monthly operational reports as may be required by the Board;

To attend all meetings of the Board of Directors and all meetings of the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors;

To perform all other duties as may be necessary in the best interest of the Corporation.

To execute agreements, checks and other documents reflecting obligations or other commitments of the Corporation under such terms and conditions as may be established by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

<u>Section 1.</u> Regular monthly meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held at such place and time as shall be determined by the Board of Directors. No written or further notice of regular stated meetings shall be required to be given. Monthly meetings may be waived.

Section 2. Special meetings may be convened by written request of either the Chair or three (3) members of the Board of Directors and may be convened by the Secretary on ninety-six (96) hours' oral or written notice.

 $\underline{\text{Section 3.}}$ A majority of the members of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum of the Board.

Section 4. Any action required or permitted at any meeting of the directors may be taken without a meeting, without prior notice, and without a vote if all of the directors entitled to vote thereon consent thereto in writing. Said written consent shall be filed with or entered upon the records of the Corporation and shall have the same effect as a vote for all purposes.

Section 5. One or more directors may participate in a properly called meeting of the Board or of a committee of the Board by means of conference telephone or other type of communications equipment by means of which all persons participating in the meeting can hear each other, and all directors so participating shall be deemed present at the meeting.

Section 6. The following actions shall require the affirmative vote of at least two-thirds (2/3) of a duly constituted quorum of Directors: (a) any liquidation, dissolution or sale of all or substantially all of the assets of the Corporation, (b) any amendment or revisions to these Bylaws, (c) any merger, consolidation or acquisition, (d) the purchase or sale of any real property of the Corporation, or (e) the removal of Directors or officers.

ARTICLE V - COMMITTEES

Section 1. The committees of the Board of Directors shall be standing and special committees. The standing committees shall be the Executive Committee, the Governance Committee, the Program/Finance Committee, the Vision & Strategy Committee, and the Investment Committee. Special committees shall be appointed by the Chair on an ad hoc basis from time to time as needed. The President shall serve as an ex officio member of all committees except for the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall consist of the Chair, Vice Chair, Secretary, Treasurer, and Assistant Secretary/Treasurer; the Vice Chair of the Corporation shall be Chair of the Executive Committee. All meetings of the Executive Committee shall be called by the Vice Chair on written or oral notice given at least twenty-four (24) hours prior to the meeting. The Executive Committee shall have power to deal with emergency matters during the interim between regular meetings of the Board of Directors; it may evaluate the operations of the Corporation, serve as counselor to the President and review annually the relationship of the President to the Board, and may review the annual report of the Corporation. All actions taken by the Executive Committee shall be reported to the next regular meeting of the Board of Directors for ratification or rejection, unless such action was previously authorized by resolution of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VI - VOLUNTEER AUXILIARY ORGANIZATION

Section 1. The Board shall encourage and foster the continued existence of a volunteer group known as The Brethren Home Auxiliary or known by such other name(s) by which said volunteer group may be denominated in the future, to aid and assist in the operation of The Brethren Home Community through contributions of money and services. The Board of Directors shall make available to said Auxiliary such facilities and services as the Auxiliary may need for the performance of its functions as determined by the Board of Directors. The Auxiliary shall function as a special committee of the Board under its separate Bylaws; provided, however, that the President of the Corporation shall be an ex officio member of the Board of Directors of the Auxiliary.

ARTICLE VII - SUPPORT AND MAINTENANCE

<u>Section 1.</u> The Corporation shall be supported and maintained by contributions, donations and legacies from all persons, firms, societies, companies and institutions who may be disposed to become contributors; and from other sources of revenue as the Board of Directors in its discretion may accept and provide. In no event shall any contribution or money received be used for individual profit, but such shall be applied absolutely to the establishment, support and maintenance of the Corporation.

ARTICLE VIII - INDEMNIFICATION

Section 1. Indemnification.

- Subject to the limitations hereinafter set forth the Corporation shall indemnify each director, officer, employee or agent of the Corporation or of any organization that he is serving as a director, officer, employee or agent at the request of the Corporation, and his/her heirs, executors or administrators, to the fullest extent permitted by law, against any Liability (that is, any and all compensatory, punitive or other damages, judgments, fines, penalties, excise tax assessed with respect to an employee benefit plan, and any costs or expenses (including, but not limited to, court costs, attorneys' fees and any amount paid in any settlement)), which were incurred or expended in connection with any Proceeding (that is, any threatened, pending or completed suit, action, appeal or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative or investigative, whether formal or informal, and whether or not the indemnified liability arises or arose from any action by or in the right of the Corporation), in which he was involved because of anything he may have done or omitted to do as a director, officer, employee or agent of the Corporation or of any organization that he may have served as a director, officer, employee or agent at the request of the Corporation, -but such indemnification can be made only if a Determination is made as hereinafter provided that such indemnification should be made. Such indemnification shall not impair any other right any such person may have.
- (b) Said indemnification can be made only if a Determination has been made, with the advice of Counsel for the Corporation, by members of the Board of Directors not involved in the claim or proceeding, or by a disinterested person or persons named by said members of the Board of Directors not involved in the claim or proceeding, or by independent legal counsel in a written opinion:
 - (1) that the directors, officer, employee or agent acted or failed to act, and in either case, in good faith, and in a manner he reasonably believed to be in, or not opposed to, the best interests of the Corporation, and with respect to any criminal action or proceeding, had no reasonable cause to believe his/her conduct was unlawful. The termination of any Proceeding by judgment, order, settlement or conviction, or upon a plea of nolo contendere or its equivalent, shall not of itself create a presumption that the person did not act in good faith and in a manner that he or she reasonably believed to be in, or not opposed to, the best interests or the Corporation and, with respect to any criminal proceedings, had reasonable cause to believe that his or her conduct was unlawful. Action with respect to an employee benefit plan taken or omitted in good faith by a Representative in a manner that he or she reasonably believed to be in the best interests of the participants and beneficiaries of the plan shall be deemed to be action in a manner that is not opposed to the best interests of the Corporation, and
 - (2) that the proposed indemnification is just and proper and can be legally made by the Corporation under then existing law, and
 - (3) that the indemnification shall be made by the Corporation in an amount stated in the Determination;

Provided, however, that the indemnification provided for herein shall not be available if the act or failure to act giving rise to the claim for indemnification has been determined by a court to have constituted willful misconduct or recklessness; the conduct of the Director,

Officer, employee or agent is based upon or attributable to his or her receipt from the Corporation of a personal benefit to which the person is not legally entitled; or the Liability of a Director, Officer, employee or agent is with respect to the administration of assets held by the Corporation in trust pursuant to Section 5547 of the Pennsylvania Nonprofit Corporation Law of 1988, as amended.

- (c) The Corporation shall not indemnify a Director, Officer, employee or agent under the preceding provisions of this Section with respect to any claim, issue or matter as to which the Director, Officer, employee or agent has been adjudged to be liable to the Corporation in a Proceeding brought by or in the right of the Corporation to procure a judgment in its favor, unless (and then only to the extent) that the court of common pleas of the judicial district embracing the county in which the Corporation's registered office is located or the court in which the action was brought determines upon application that, despite the adjudication of Liability but in view of all of the circumstances of the case, the Director, Officer, employee or agent is fairly and reasonably entitled to indemnification from the Corporation for the expenses that such court deems proper.
- (d) Unless ordered by court, any indemnification of a Director. Officer, employee or agent under preceding provisions of this Section shall be made by the Corporation only upon a determination made in the specific case that such indemnification of the Director, Officer, employee or agent is proper in the circumstances because he or she has met the applicable standard of conduct set forth in the preceding provisions of this paragraph. Such determination shall be made the Board.
- (e) To the extent that a Director, Officer, employee or agent has been successful on the merits or otherwise in defense of any Proceeding referred to in Section 5741 or Section 5742 of the Pennsylvania Nonprofit Corporation Law of 1988, as amended, or in defense of any claim, issue or matter therein, such Director, Officer, employee or agent shall be indemnified by the Corporation against expenses (including without limitation attorneys' fees and costs of Proceedings) actually and reasonably incurred by such person in connection therewith.
- (f) If a Director, Officer, employee or agent is entitled to indemnification under this Section in respect of a portion, but not all, of a Liability to which the Director, Officer, employee or agent is subject, the Corporation shall indemnify the Director, Officer, employee or agent to the maximum extent for such portion of the Liability.

Section 2. <u>Limitation on Indemnification.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of this Article, the Corporation shall not indemnify a Director, Officer, employee or agent under this Article for any Liability incurred in a Proceeding which was initiated by the Director, Officer, employee or agent (which shall not be deemed to include counter-claims or affirmative defenses) or in which the Director, Officer, employee or agent participated as an intervenor or amicus curiae, unless such initiation of or participation in the Proceeding is authorized, either before or after its commencement, by the affirmative vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the directors then in office who were and are not parties to the Proceeding, subject to the approval of the Board.

Section 3. Advance Payment of Expenses. Expenses incurred by an officer, director, employee or agent in defending a civil or criminal action, suit or proceeding shall be paid by the Corporation in advance of the final disposition of such action, suit or proceeding upon receipt of an undertaking by or on behalf of such person to repay such amount if it shall ultimately be determined that the person is not entitled to be indemnified by the Corporation.

Section 4. Insurance or Indemnification Fund. The Corporation shall have the power to buy and maintain insurance and to establish and fund a self-insurance indemnification reserve fund on behalf of the directors, officers, employees and agents of the Corporation and a person serving at the request of the Corporation as a director, officer, employee or agent of another organization, against liability incurred in any such capacity, or arising out of his/her status as such.

<u>Section 5.</u> Validity. The invalidity of any portion of this Article VIII shall not affect the validity of the remainder hereof.

<u>Section 6.</u> Application. This Article shall not apply to any actions filed or any breach of performance of duty or any failure of performance of duty prior to January 27, 1987.

<u>ARTICLE IX – LIMITATION ON PERSONAL LIABILITY OF DIRECTOR AND STANDARD OF CARE</u>

<u>Section 1.</u> A Director of this Corporation shall not be personally liable for monetary damages as such for any action taken, or any failure to take any action, unless:

- (a) the Director has breached or failed to perform the duties of his office in good faith, in a manner he reasonably believes to be in the best interests of the Corporation, and with such care, including reasonable inquiry, skill and diligence, as a person of ordinary prudence would use under similar circumstances; and
- (b) the breach or failure to perform constitutes self-dealing, willful misconduct or recklessness.

The provisions of this Article VIII shall not apply to the responsibility or liability of a Director pursuant to any criminal statute or for the payment of taxes pursuant to local, state or federal law and shall not apply to any actions filed or any breach of performance of duty or any failure of performance of duty prior to January 27, 1987.

Section 2.

- (a) A Director of the Corporation shall stand in a fiduciary relationship to the Corporation, and shall perform his or her duties as a director, including his or her duties as a member of any committee of the Board of Directors upon which he or she may serve, in good faith, in a manner he or she reasonably believes to be in the best interests of the Corporation, and with such care, including reasonable inquiry, skill and diligence, as a person of ordinary prudence would use under similar circumstances. In performing his or her duties, a Director shall be entitled to rely in good faith on information, opinions, reports or statements, including financial statements and other financial data, in each case prepared or presented by any of the following:
 - (1) one or more officers or employees of the Corporation whom the Director reasonably believes to be reliable and competent in the matters presented;
 - (2) legal counsel, auditors or other persons as to matters which the Director reasonably believes to be within the professional or expert competence of such person; and
 - (3) a committee of the Board of Directors upon which he or she does not serve, duly designated in accordance with these Bylaws, as to matters within its designated authority, which committee the Director reasonably believes to merit confidence. A Director shall not be considered to be acting in good faith if he or she has knowledge concerning the matter in question that would cause his or her reliance to be unwarranted.
- (b) In discharging the duties of their respective positions, the Board, committees of the Board of Directors and individual Directors may, in considering the best interests of the Corporation, consider the effects of any action upon employees, upon persons with whom the Corporation has business and other relations and upon communities which the offices or other establishments of or related to the Corporation are located, and all other pertinent factors. The consideration of those factors shall not constitute a violation of subsection (a) of this Section.

(c) Absent breach of fiduciary duty, lack of good faith or self-dealing, actions taken as a Director or any failure to take any action shall be presumed to be in the best interests of the Corporation.

ARTICLE X - CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

Section 1. At the organizational meeting each director shall disclose to the Board of Directors each business, professional or personal interest which may, in the opinion of that director, or in the opinion of others, influence the judgment of that director with respect to the affairs of the Corporation. A record of such conflict of interest shall be preserved in the minutes of that meeting. That director shall during the remainder of that year abstain from voting on any issue relating to matters so disclosed and, unless otherwise noted in the minutes of a subsequent meeting, that director shall be presumed to have so abstained

Section 2. No contract or transaction between the Corporation and one or more of the directors or officers of the Corporation or The Brethren Home Community, or any of its affiliated corporations (the "Brethren Affiliates") or parents, children or siblings of such directors or officers, or the Corporation and any corporation, partnership, association, or other organization in which one or more of the directors or officers of the Corporation or the Brethren Affiliates, or parents, children or siblings of such directors or officers, have a financial interest shall be authorized by the Corporation unless it is approved in accordance with the policy established, (or to be established) by the Board of Directors entitled, "Transactions With Interested Directors or Officers".

ARTICLE XI REMOVAL OF DIRECTORS

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall review any allegations related to a Director's conduct brought before it, and, after an investigation of the allegation which may or may not include an interview with the Director at issue, may make a recommendation to the Board of Directors that the Director should be removed. Thereafter the Board of Directors may take action, in accordance with Article IV, Section 6 of these Bylaws, on such recommendation at a regularly scheduled Board meeting or at a special meeting called for such purpose.

<u>Section 2.</u> Any Director whose conduct is called into question who is a member of the Executive Committee is also shall not attend or participate in any Executive Committee meeting or investigation involving said Director.

Section 3. Any Director who is subject to removal by the Board of Directors shall not attend any portion of any Board meeting where said Director's removal is to be deliberated and/or voted upon. The Board, at its sole and option and discretion, may or may not allow the Director up for removal to make a statement before the Board prior the formal vote on removal.

ARTICLE XII - AMENDMENTS

Section 1. The Bylaws may be amended, alerted, restated or otherwise revised by the Board of Directors by a vote of two-thirds (2/3) of a duly constituted quorum of the Directors. Any notice of meeting of the Directors at which a proposed amendment to these Bylaws is to be considered shall include a copy of the proposed amendment or a summary of the changes to be effected thereby.

Positioning Statement:

The Brethren Home Foundation (TBHF) and Cross Keys Village-The Brethren Home Community (CKV-TBHC): Legal Restructuring and Relationship Strengthening with the Southern Pennsylvania District Church of the Brethren (SOPA)

To solidify and clarify our overall governance structure, TBHF and CKV-TBHC are undergoing a legal restructuring of their organizations. As part of this process, TBHF and CKV-TBHC will be moving toward a partnership versus agency relationship with SOPA. This important step, guided by thoughtful consideration and sound legal counsel, is intended to provide legal protection for SOPA, TBHF, and CKV-TBHC while preserving and reinforcing the meaningful relationship we have built together over generations.

As it stands, the current membership relationship between SOPA and TBHF poses potential legal liability for SOPA churches, church members, and other affiliated agencies. In today's increasingly complex and regulated environment, this legal connection presents growing risks to both parties. By undergoing this legal restructuring, we are taking a proactive and protective measure—one that ensures we can carry out our mission responsibly while enhancing our relationship with SOPA.

This change is not about moving away from our heritage. It is about honoring it in a way that allows TBHF, CKV-TBHC, and SOPA to thrive. Our Brethren values continue to guide our work and our community life. We remain fully committed to the principles of service, humility, and fellowship that have defined our mutually beneficial relationship from the beginning.

We understand that a change like this may raise questions, particularly for those who care deeply about tradition and SOPA's long-standing role in the life of our organization. Please know that this decision was not made lightly and comes only after careful reflection and consultation. It is our sincerest desire to protect what matters most—our people, our mission, and our connection to SOPA.

Looking ahead, we are eager to continue working together in ways that enrich SOPA, TBHF, and CKV-TBHC. We value open communication and welcome the opportunity to stay actively engaged in shared conversations, ministry efforts, and events. Our intention is that this transition creates new opportunities for collaboration and growth, grounded in mutual trust and a shared sense of purpose.

Tangible ways we intend to increase our relationship include the following:

- · Sending communication updates via SOPA's newsletter.
- Submitting regular information via the Village Voice newsletter for distribution to the churches.
- Attendance by TBHF and CKV-TBHC leadership at SOPA's District Conference each year to provide updates similar to other SOPA agencies.
- TBHF's Vice President will meet with church pastors on an annual basis and also attend SOPA's Executive Committee's board meeting annually.
- Accept SOPA Board nominations for consideration.
- TBHF's and CKV-TBHC's Board member orientations shall include instruction on the Church of the Brethren's
 values and mission, as well as TBHF's and CKV-TBHC's longstanding relationship with SOPA.
- Providing office space for SOPA on the CKV-TBHC campus.



Standing Committee & District Commission Reports

Standing Committee Report Report to the 2025 District Conference

The Standing Committee of Annual Conference 2025 met before the start of this year's Annual Conference in Greensboro, North Carolina. Standing Committee met Sunday, June 29 through Wednesday, July 2. The first meeting was a get acquainted dinner and sharing time for Standing Committee Members scheduled for 5:00 pm on Sunday evening. The Moderator for this year was Dava Hensley, and she was in charge of this dinner and sharing time.

As the old cliché goes, 'Standing' Committee doesn't do much standing, it was non-stop full days of meetings from Sunday evening to Wednesday at noon. Standing Committee is made up of 28 Delegates elected by the various 23 Districts. In addition to the Standing Committee Delegates the immediate past Moderator is also in attendance and a part of Standing Committee. Districts have one, two, or three Delegates based upon the number of members in that District. Southern Pennsylvania has one Delegate. It was my privilege to represent you at Annual Conference.

One of the main responsibilities of Standing Committee is to go over each Business Item on the Annual Conference Agenda and recommend an answer to the Delegate Body of Annual Conference. This allows for, hopefully, a quicker time in doing the business related to these Items. The Delegates may then accept, reject, or amend the recommendations from Standing Committee.

Another major function of Standing Committee is to serve as the judicial body of the Church, hearing any appeals relating from brokenness between Districts, Congregations, and individuals. There were no Appeals presented this year, although Standing Committee did have a Listening Session with Bridgewater Church of the Brethren from the Shenandoah District. This session was a first for Standing Committee with this process being adopted in 2021.

One of the primary functions of Standing Committee is to make recommendations on the Unfinished Business Items, as well as the New Business Items and Queries coming to Annual Conference. The following Items were presented to Standing Committee for their input. Standing Committee made recommendations for each Item, and then these Items were presented to the Annual Conference Delegates for their consideration and for their action.

Unfinished Business Items

- UB 1. Query: Standing with People of Color The Annual Conference delegate body received the final report of the committee.
- UB 2. Query: Breaking Down Barriers Increasing Access to Denominational Events *The Annual Conference received the final report of the committee and adopted the four recommendations.*
- UB 3. Request for an Annual Conference Study on Calling Denominational Leadership The written and oral final reports of the Calling Denominational Leadership Committee were received as information for the delegates. Recommendation 1 was adopted by a two-thirds majority as a

matter of polity and one amendment was incorporated into the text of the minutes of the 2025 Annual Conference. Recommendations 2-8 were adopted by simple majority.

New Business Items

- NB 1. Recommendation that Agency Status of Bethany Theological Seminary be Renewed Annual Conference adopted the Standing Committee recommendation that the agency status of Bethany Theological Seminary be renewed.
- NB 2. Recommendation that Agency Status of Eder Financial, Incorporated be Renewed

Annual Conference adopted the Standing Committee recommendation that the agency status of Eder Financial, Incorporated be renewed.

NB 3. Recommendation that Agency Status of On Earth Peace be Renewed Annual Conference adopted the Standing Committee recommendation that the agency status of On Earth Peace be renewed.

NB 4. Query: Reducing Harm: Interim Steps to Address Suffering *This query was adopted and answered twofold:*

- 1. We lament that conversion therapy was considered a safe or viable option in previous Annual Conference statements, and do not endorse "conversion to heterosexual orientation [as] another option" (Human Sexuality from a Christian Perspective, 1983).
- 2. We acknowledge that Annual Conference's position statements should reflect the denomination's current best discernment of the way of life God calls us to live' (2025 Annual Conference Booklet, p. 66), and recognize that some existing position statements on human sexuality appear out of step with current realities and merit further discernment. In the interest of unity and care for all in the body, we await the Spirit's leading for renewed study. While the current statements on human sexuality remain on record, we seek to honor and love all in the body by lifting up guidance that builds safer and more compassionate communities, including:
- \cdot "challenging openly the widespread fear, hatred, and harassment of [people in the LGBTQ+ community],"
- \cdot "advocating the rights of [LGBTQ+ people] to jobs, housing, and legal justice," and
- \cdot "engaging in open, forthright conversations with [people in the LGBTQ+ community]... stop alienating one another and instead venture toward understanding."

(All quotes from Human Sexuality from a Christian Perspective, 1983.)

Annual Conference adopted the Standing Committee recommendation by more than a two-thirds majority (301-90).

NB 5. Query: Concerns about Current Practices Related to Matters of Sexuality

Annual Conference adopted the Standing Committee recommendation that the concerns of the query be accepted as a legitimate question and be referred to the Review and Evaluation Committee.

NB 6. Recommended Cost of Living Adjustment to the Minimum Cash Salary Table for Pastors Annual Conference adopted the Standing Committee recommendation that the Cost of Living Adjustment of 2.6% to the Minimum Cash Salary Table for Pastors be adopted.

The future locations for Annual Conference 2026 and 2027 are:

2026 Fort Wayne, Indiana June 28 – July2 (Sunday – Thursday)

2027 Daytona Beach, Florida July 28 – August 1 (Wednesday – Sunday)

The Annual Conference Moderator for 2026 is Don Fitzkee, and the Annual Conference Moderator for 2027 will be Dennis Beckner.

Continue to pray that the Church, the true Church of Jesus Christ, will stand strong and be invincible. It is Romans 8:35 – 39 that relates this: "35Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? 36As it is written, For thy sake we are killed all the day long; we are accounted as sheep for the slaughter. 37Nay, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him that loved us. 38For I am persuaded, that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, 39Nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord."

District Ministry Commission Report to the 2025 District Conference September 19 -20, 2025

It seems like it was just yesterday that we were meeting for our 2024 District Conference at the Newville Church of the Brethren. But here we are at the Hanover Church of the Brethren. I appreciate the theme for this year, (Prayer Changes...Things – Me – You.) Hebrews 4: 14-16. That is certainly true and we need to continue to pray for the Church of Jesus Christ and each other.

For the District Ministry Commission, 2025 has been a very busy year again. The Ministry Commission meets every month to work at supporting, encouraging, and empowering the Ministers of our district to faithfully serve not only the District, but especially the Members of their respective congregations. The Ministry Commission is invested in trying to make the ministers' jobs and responsibilities just a bit more easy. We, as a Ministry Commission, want to come along side each minister and candidate to provide the necessary components to make their ministry successful. Every minister is important and the work they do is of utmost importance as they serve their Lord first and then their congregation and the District.

Just a few of the things the Ministry Commission does is to have interviews with all those who are considering entering into ministry here in our District. Needless to say, these interviews take considerable time and depending on whether we interview one or two candidates, this is the bulk of the time for the Commission's meeting. Each candidate fills out an Interview Guide and this guide is shared with the Commission members for them to get to know the candidate. Then the Candidate comes for the interview and questions are asked by Commission Members of the Candidate. This is very helpful for us to both encourage and know how to help the candidate. The Ministry Commission also requires mentors for each Candidate who entered into ministry so that the Candidate has an ally, a friend, and a companion to whom they may direct questions and/or seek that person's input. Said mentor is required to be a Church of the Brethren Ordained Minister from the District.

This past year the Commission worked with Mark Clapper from Elizabethtown College in connection with the Elizabethtown College Christian Leadership Scholarship Grant that was set up many years ago. This Fund was put into place by the giving of several couples and individuals from our District. The Fund has grown to quite a large account, and Elizabethtown College solicited our help in disbursing the monies in this Fund. The agreement that the District Ministry Commission reached with Elizabethtown College states in part:

"Elizabethtown College acknowledges, with gratitude, the support from the Southern Pennsylvania District Board, Harvey S. and Ruth Z. Kline, G. Book and Arlene Roth, and the estate of Sara Walker, to establish the Christian Leadership Scholarship. The Christian Leadership Scholarship (hereafter referred to as the "Christian Leadership Scholarship") shall be administered according to the following guidelines and provisions."

Unfortunately, the agreement was reached past the time allotment for disbursement in the 2025 academic year. Going forward, the college will make the funds available to eligible candidates. Because of this renewed District/Elizabethtown College relationship, on Friday, April 25, 2025 at 5:30 p.m., Linda Titzell representing the District Ministry Commission and John Shelly, representing the District Board had the opportunity to attend "A Century and a Quarter of Excellence & Innovation: 125 Years of Elizabethtown College," dinner program and celebration. A copy of the revised "Christian Leadership Scholarship" was executed and is attached herewith for your information. Feel free to share it with the folks in your congregation.

Another item that demands a great deal of our time is the obligation of meeting the reordination requirements. All ordained ministers need to meet these requirements every five years. These requirements need to be fulfilled by the end of 2025 for reordination. These requirements include: Current Background Check documentation; Current Ethics Training; and Child Protection/Mandated Reporting Training and record of CEU (Continuing Education Units) credits. Opportunities to meet the necessary requirements for all of these areas have been provided by our District.

There are many other items that are too numerous to deal with here that require our attention as a Commission. In closing this report, we want to emphasize that Georgia Markey, currently serving as Interim DE, has been a valuable asset for and with the District Ministry Commission and for our District.

It is always a blessing and a privilege to serve the District, our ministers, and our congregations. Thank You for your support and your prayers, especially your prayers, as we strive to serve our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ into the future. The greatest thing you can do, if it can be called that, is to pray for your Minster (s). I believe I closed last year's report with this but it is still so pertinent and so applicable especially in light of the times in which we live. We want to leave you with this verse from Romans which tells us this – Romans 10:15 (KJV) ..."And how shall they preach, except they be sent? As it is written, How beautiful are the feet of them that preach the gospel of peace, and bring glad tidings of good things!" The ICB says it this way – Romans 10:15 (ICB)..."And before someone can go and tell them, he must be sent. It is written, "How beautiful is the person who comes to bring good news." It should be noted that this is a quotation that comes from Isaiah 52:7.

Elizabethtown College acknowledges with gratitude the support from the Southern Pennsylvania District Board, Harvey S. and Ruth Z. Kline, G. Book and Arlene Roth, and the estate of Sara Walker to establish the Christian Leadership Scholarship. The Christian Leadership Scholarship (hereafter referred to as the "Christian Leadership Scholarship") shall be administered according to the following guidelines and provisions:

- The Christian Leadership Scholarship was established as a permanent endowment at Elizabethtown College by the Southern Pennsylvania District Board, Harvey S.'43 H'84 and Ruth Z.'46 Kline, G. Book '44 and Arlene Roth '43, and the estate of Sara Walker (hereafter referred to as "Donors").
- The Christian Leadership Scholarship will be utilized to provide a need-based scholarship with a
 preference given to an undergraduate student(s) who is a member of a congregation under the
 Southern Pennsylvania District.
- If there is no eligible Southern Pennsylvania District student(s), the preference would be made to an
 eligible student(s) at any Church of the Brethren.
- 4. If there is no eligible Church of the Brethren student(s), the award may be received by a student(s) from Adams, Centre, Clinton, Cumberland, Franklin, Fulton, Huntingdon, Juniata, Mifflin, Perry, Snyder, Union, or York counties in Pennsylvania.
- 5. Student recipients will be determined by the Elizabethtown College Office of Financial Aid.
- The Donors will be furnished with an annual financial report.
- 7. Disbursements will be made on an annual basis from earnings on the endowed fund. Any unused or income earnings in excess of the annual disbursement fees and other recent expenses will be reinvested in the principal of the Christian Leadership Scholarship.
- 8. The Christian Leadership Scholarship will be administered in accordance with the policies and procedures as established by the Board of Trustees of the College.
- Should the guidelines and provisions of the Christian Leadership Scholarship require modification, College staff shall engage the Southern Pennsylvania District Ministry Commission or its successor in that process per the policies and procedures of the College.
- 10. If the Board of Trustees of the College reasonably determines that the purpose for which the Christian Leadership Scholarship was established is no longer possible or necessary, the Board of Trustees shall designate that the monies from the Christian Leadership Scholarship are to be used for other appropriate purposes as nearly aligned to the original interest of the Donor as good conscience and need dictate within the authorized powers of the College.


In March and April, we worked to acquire volunteers to help with the Chicken Canning project held at Christian Aid Ministries. This ministry, a joint effort between the SOPA District and the Mid Atlantic District, canned 9,720 two-pound cans of chicken thighs over a period of four days in late April. The canned product was then distributed to each district for local use and to the Shady Grove Ruritan Club, a non-profit organization which has been working on Hurricane Helene relief in North Carolina. The chicken was then distributed to food banks, soup kitchens, and community agencies to distribute to those in need.

We continue to support the work of the Carlisle Truck Stop Ministry. We recently learned of the dissolution of PCAP and therefore, that support has been removed from our budget.

New this year was a district-wide picnic/vesper service held at Little Buffalo State Park on July 27. The carry in potluck meal was provided and shared by all in attendance with the meat being provided by members of the Witness Commission. Music during the vesper service was led by Cody and Ali Toms while the evening's message was brought to us by commission member, Chris Elliot. Approximately 60% of our district's churches were represented with about 60 people in attendance. The idea for the picnic was based on the scriptural truth that we are stronger when we work together as one body in Christ (see Romans 12:5), and this event gave us the opportunity to meet and get to know our brothers and sisters of the SOPA better. There were many positive comments heard with the words, "next year's picnic" a prevalent sentiment mentioned!

INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANT'S REPORT ON APPLYING AGREED-UPON PROCEDURES

Board of Directors and Management Southern District of Pennsylvania Church of the Brethren Gardners, Pennsylvania

We have performed the procedures enumerated below, which were agreed to by the Board of Directors and management of the Southern District of Pennsylvania Church of the Brethren (the District), to assist the Board of Directors and management of the District in evaluating the completeness and accuracy of certain accounting records and transactions which the District has specified, as of and for the year ended December 31, 2024. Management of the Southern District of Pennsylvania Church of the Brethren is responsible for the District's accounting records. The sufficiency of these procedures is solely the responsibility of those parties specified in this report. Consequently, we make no representation regarding the sufficiency of the procedures enumerated below either for the purpose for which this report has been requested or for any other purpose.

The agreed-upon procedures were performed, and the associated findings are as follows:

Revenue

 We selected a sample of deposits, one from each month of 2024, from the weekly cash receipts spreadsheet, and obtained the corresponding deposit receipt and attachments. Each deposit receipt was checked for mathematical accuracy and agreement with the attached remittance documentation.

We traced the deposits to their postings in the *QuickBooks* and/or *Power Church* accounting systems as applicable and compared the date, amount and description of the entry to the deposit receipt for agreement.

We inspected the account classification assigned to the deposit entry and compared it to the underlying documentation. We reviewed the supporting documentation for indication of any time or use restrictions.

Revenue (Continued)

We traced the deposits to inclusion in the applicable bank statement noting the agreement of the date and amount with the deposit receipt.

- All deposit receipts inspected were mathematically accurate and supported by remittance documentation. Respective, deposit entries posted in the District's accounting system agreed to the underlying deposit receipts in amount and date.
- Account classifications assigned to deposits were consistent with the underlying documentation, including any time or use restrictions.
- All deposits inspected were posted to the respective bank statements and agreed in amount and date.
- 2. We requested confirmation of six congregations' fair share giving as recorded in the District's accounting records. The sample of congregations was selected using a systematic approach.
 - All confirmations agreed with the District's accounting records.

Expenditures

1. We randomly selected a sample of twelve expenditures from the discretionary accounts, QuickBooks Journal detail, with the exclusion of the payments to the four District Mission agencies. The sample was obtained from the population of all checks written and recorded in these accounts. We obtained the cancelled checks and supporting invoice/requisition, loan agreement, designated-giving report, or line-item budget supporting documentation, whichever was applicable.

We compared the cancelled checks to the supporting documentation for agreement of amount and payee and compared the cancelled checks to the entry in the accounting system for agreement of date, amount and payee. We compared the signatures on the cancelled checks to the list of authorized check signors provided by the bank.

We inspected the supporting documentation for evidence of approval by an authorized member of management. We compared the account classification code assigned to the expenditure to the District's chart of accounts.

- No exceptions were found as a result of applying the procedures.
- We obtained paid invoices for the purchase of meat and rental facilities used during the meatcanning project. We compared these invoices to the amounts recorded in the temporarily restricted account for agreement of description and amounts.
 - No exceptions were found as a result of applying the procedures.

Cash and Investment Balances

- We compared the investment account balance per the year-end statements to the amounts recorded in the general ledger.
 - No exceptions were found as a result of applying the procedure.
- 2. We re-performed the bank reconciliations for the months of January, May, August, November 2024, for the restricted bank account.
 - · No exceptions were found as a result of applying the procedure.
- 3. We traced all deposits and checks from the unrestricted account's bank statement to the transactions recorded in the general ledger checking account in the *Power Church* system for April and July 2024. We also traced all deposits and checks from the general ledger to the transactions posted in the unrestricted account's bank statement for January and October 2024.
 - No exceptions were found as a result of applying the procedure.
- 4. We inspected the journal entries posted to the cash account in the *Power Church* system for the months of January, April, July, October 2024, to record bank-reconciling items, and traced those amounts to the respective bank statements.
 - No exceptions were found as a result of applying the procedures.

This agreed-upon procedures engagement was conducted in accordance with attestation standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Dear Sisters and Brothers,

These reflections from people who work with and observe Brethren Disaster Ministries' (BDM) programs demonstrate that the staff and volunteers embrace and embody the call heard in 1 John. Their deeds and the truth are evident in how they live and all they do to bring healing, hope, and recovery to disaster survivors. Those who support BDM's ministries through prayer, financial contributions, in-kind donations, advocacy, and volunteering at all levels join as cherished partners in our mission to show God's love.

Hurricane Helene struck Florida on Sept. 26, 2024, and moved north causing major flooding all the way to southern Virginia. It was a reminder of how devastating and unpredictable disasters can be but also highlighted the strength of the Church working together for our neighbor's good. All of BDM actively responded to this catastrophic event, including Children's Disaster Services (CDS) sending volunteer teams to North Carolina; multiple coordinating calls with the Southeastern and Atlantic Southeast Districts; volunteer and relief supply coordination with the Virlina District and North Carolina's Camp Carmel; the purchase of special supplies such as mold remediation materials; and providing Emergency Disaster Fund (EDF) grants to support district level responses. The mission expanded when Hurricane Milton struck Florida two weeks later, compounding the damage from Helene and prompting the sending of additional CDS teams. Working together through Christ, the BDM network helped "bear one another's burdens." Home rebuilding in North Carolina is scheduled to start in the fall of 2025. Hurricanes Helene and Milton were just two of many disasters and crises that BDM responded to in 2024.

Children's Disaster Services volunteers served in eight MARCs (multi-agency resource centers) in response to multiple tornadoes in the South Central, Midwest, and Southeastern US regions in the spring and summer of 2024 and also responded to one flooding event and four wildfires. In the fall, at the request of the Red Cross to care for children impacted by the hurricanes, three CDS teams served four weeks in shelters and a Family Assistance Center in the Asheville, N.C., area and two teams served in shelters in the Tampa Bay, Fla., area. During the year CDS responded to 13 disasters, sending 68 volunteers who served 729 child contacts.

In early January 2025 wildfires in California stretched CDS to respond in multiple locations with four teams serving 515 children in the area in a little over a month. Spring tornadoes sent CDS to the plains states and Midwest to serve more children and families.

The Rebuilding Program completed 22 months of service to families impacted by the 2021 tornadoes in Dawson Springs, Ky. Additional support for this project site came from a Lowe's 2024 Winter Cycle Reconstruction Grant facilitated through NVOAD (National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster). In response to the deadly 2022 flooding in Eastern Kentucky, a BDM volunteer group served survivors for a week in April 2024 in Letcher County and a new

long-term site opened there in the fall. BDM's partner described its arrival in September as "perfect timing" because they were lacking volunteers just at the time that federal and state funding was becoming available to build new homes.

Smaller responses included collaboration with the leadership in three districts in Pennsylvania to coordinate local flood responses in the Eastwick/Cobbs Creek neighborhood of Philadelphia and in York County. Two EDF grants were provided for the York County response to purchase materials installed by BDM volunteers and to support a local partner providing Disaster Case Management.

Through our project sites, 39 families received support from 600 weekly volunteers who provided 4,636 hours of service on their homes. This free labor provided a cost savings of \$1,242,077 to the families and local partners. Sixty-five disaster project leaders served in 2024.

Tragically, in 2024 international responses once again focused much more on supporting families impacted by violence, a human-caused crisis, than on natural disasters. In January 2025, the rebel group M23 invaded and occupied villages and cities in the Eastern DR Congo, displacing millions including Church of the Brethren members in North and South Kivu provinces. BDM is partnering with DR Congo and Burundi church leaders to help develop, support, and coordinate responses. In South Sudan political and ethnic violence has escalated to the brink of a civil war. BDM and Global Mission staff are working with leaders from the South Sudan mission to expand humanitarian response plans while supporting the mission. EDF grants are already supporting families displaced by this violence.

A total of \$564,000 in EDF grants funded war-related relief and recovery programs in the DR Congo, Lebanon, Nigeria, Palestine, South Sudan, and Ukraine. This was the first year that grants provided aid and relief to families impacted by the Israel-Hamas war in the Palestinian territories and Israel's attacks on Hezbollah in southern Lebanon. Smaller grants provided critical storm and flood relief in Burundi, the DR Congo, Dominican Republic, and South Sudan. Grants to partners in Mexico and the Dominican Republic supported the needs of refugees. Another area of ongoing focus is a response to the crisis in Haiti, including a failed government and sections of the country controlled by violent gangs, leaving families and congregations struggling to survive.

The Nigeria Crisis Response (NCR), in collaboration with EYN (Church of the Brethren in Nigeria), received \$225,000 in EDF funds in 2024. Amidst ongoing, and often increasing, violence and insecurity, NCR maintains its focus on sponsorship of camps for internally displaced people; supporting EYN refugees returning from Cameroon, food distributions; medical assistance; livelihood training centers for widows and orphans; seeds and fertilizer; new wells for drinking water; education assistance for orphan children; and home repairs for the most vulnerable.

This ministry is only possible because the whole church is working together. Individual members and supporters, volunteers, churches, and districts are part of the body of Christ coming together to pray, serve, give hope, and help families heal. Through all this we pray more people come to God and know God's amazing love. Together, living in deed and truth, we build the body and bear witness to God's love for all.

Our organization has trust in the Lord, and we have planted our ministry with children and their families in three counties we serve, and we continue to send out our roots by the stream. In the heat and in the drought, we remain green, and we continue to bear fruit in this ministry to empower children and their families to build stronger, healthier lives.

In-kind gifts from individuals, businesses, and churches are an example of the fruit that we are humbly grateful for and is one way for churches to actively engage in our ministry with children and their families. Volunteering for our agency has risen significantly over last year. 94 volunteers came to the agency with over 2223 volunteer hours this year. Volunteers save nonprofits time and help to reduce operating costs. Current estimates in the nonprofit sector indicate that a volunteer hour is valued at \$34.79 saving CAS approximately \$77,338 in 2024-2025



We are blessed by the donation drives throughout the congregations of the SOPA COB. Your support has demonstrated once again that it is the help and generosity of others that makes it possible for Children's Aid Society to help hundreds of children and families each year. The district and the churches in the district led the way this year once again in being guiding partners for our commitment to empowering children and their families build stronger healthier lives.

CAS continues to be involved with the 'Give Local York' and Adams County Community Foundation 'Giving Spree' events. These events help CAS have a presence in the philanthropic communities in which we serve and interact with current and new donors to introduce them our agency vision and mission.

Youth Collaboration for Attendance at the Children's Aid Society

In late 2024, CAS was selected to take the lead role from the United Way of York County in delivering the Youth Collaboration for Attendance program. Youth Collaboration for Attendance (formerly known as Youth Court Alliance) is a school-based program that offers students who have been truant, and their families, the ability to resolve and correct the truant behavior and avoid costly Magisterial



District Court fines. It is an effective and inexpensive program that uses restorative justice principles, rather than punitive sanctions, to reengage the truant youth in school.

CAS will took this year to re-design the model of YCA. We look forward to developing this program and implementing it in multiple school districts in the fall of 2025.

34th Annual "Hybrid" Auction - Benefitting the Lehman Crisis Nursery

The annual auction was held by the Lehman Center auxiliary and was the 5th 'hybrid' style Auction, where we had both virtual, and live auctions. This year's income is over \$57,325! The level of dedication demonstrated by the Lehman Center auxiliary is one of the many reasons that this event is so successful year after year. Thank you to all our dedicated volunteers who make this event a success.



Each One of Our Centers is unique both in terms of the community it serves and the services it delivers. The following reports cover the period of July 1, 2024, through Jun 30, 2025.

The Lehman Center – The Lehman Center in York is located on West Market Street in the heart of York City. TLC serves as the home to our crisis nursery, creative art therapy, family advocate, parent support groups, parent crisis hotline, The Incredible Years parenting program, and our new program, The Youth Collaboration for Attendance.



Crisis Nursery – Staff completed 409 intakes on 97 children, newborn through age 6. The hours that a child stays at the nursery can vary from three hours during the day, so a parent can go to a job interview, to

three days and nights of care, to keep a child safe from domestic violence and abuse. The children come from families usually headed by a single parent and many live in poverty. More and more we see grandchildren living with grandparents utilizing our services.

<u>Creative Art Therapy</u> – This treatment method takes advantage of a child using stories to narrate their concerns and their view of their world. As they complete craft projects, drawings, play acting, or other creative modalities, children relax and share what in their life is troubling. For the children living in York, violence is a daily occurrence in their neighborhoods and their therapy sessions help them to cope with the anxiety and stress of their adverse childhood experiences. The therapists at The Lehman Center helped 20 children, ages 3 to 18, cope with the challenges in their lives through 611 hours of art therapy.

<u>Family Advocacy</u> – Our family advocates in York County have worked with 48 families this year. They help them find resources in the community for food, rent, jobs and other basic life needs. 811 hours have been spent with these families helping them improve their ability to care for their children and to help these families build stronger and healthier lives.

Parent Support Groups —This past year in York and at two community locations we have had success with trained volunteers working both in person at the prison as well as virtually with 78 parents during 267 hours of group sessions. During these session parents learn about better ways to care for their children and they shared their concerns and lessons they have learned with each other. The agency continues to partner with the York County Children Youth



and Families to be one of two providers to support the countywide parent education program the "Incredible Years" an evidence based parent education and support group program proven to reduce child abuse & negelect in families of parents who have successfully completed the training. This year we held IY cohort groups training 27 parents and 201 hours total of training.

<u>24 Hour Parent Hotline</u> – Crisis Nursery caregivers staff a 24-hour hotline to help parents in crisis and to answer questions for parents. This year they answered more than 877 calls.

Cornerstone Youth Home -

Cornerstone Youth Home's mission is Increasing a student's capacity for life-long educational success by disrupting the cycle of homelessness and transience in a safe, stable, restorative practice home environment.



The program concentrates on Increasing a student's capacity for life-long educational success by disrupting the cycle of homelessness and transience in a safe, stable, restorative practice home environment.

York County students have experienced housing instability for decades. Community leaders and educators recognized the problem, try to address root issues and understand the negative impact transiency had on education, health equity, employment

Frances Leiter Center –Located on the Lincoln Highway in Chambersburg, the Center's therapists use creative art therapy and psychotherapy techniques to help children ages 3 to 18 express the challenges that face them. Therapy engages the child in an activity that puts them at ease and lets them express their emotions in age-appropriate ways.



For a three-year-old, this activity may be playing in a sand tray, while a fifteen-year-old prefers to shoot hoops on our backyard basketball court. 10 children participated in 54 hours of creative art therapy and psychotherapy during the past year.


Family Advocacy & Parent Support programs Started in 2022; We have been able to offer our Family Advocacy & Parent Support group programs in Franklin County. These programs have allowed us to now offer Family Advocacy services and Parent support groups in all three of the counties we serve. Our Family Advocate collaborates with families to provide increased, individualized support. They work with caregivers to understand the goals they have for their family and the obstacles they face. They then help families find the community resources they need to provide a supportive environment for their children.

This past year our Family Advocate has seen 23 families through 404 hours of service, an increase of 9 families and 269 hours of service over last year

Werner Early Learning Childcare Center (WELCC)-

On May 15, 2025, the Children's Aid Society celebrated a milestone in their mission to support families in York County—the ribbon-cutting of the new Werner Early Learning Childcare Center.

Local leaders, community supporters, project partners, and staff gathered to commemorate the grand opening of the 18,368-square-foot facility, built by Wagman Construction and designed by Core Design Group.



The space also includes a new early childhood education area, a new program for the Children's Aid Society that has dedicated spaces for infants, toddlers, preschool, and pre K aged children. Filling the void and need for traditional childcare in the greater York area.





The crisis respite nursery, one of only three in Pennsylvania, provides emergency care when families need it most In addressing an acute gap in local childcare services, the center also plans to offer licensed third-shift childcare, filling a vital need in York County where none previously existed

This space also has expanded staff areas to include a large community training room, dining room, as well as a conference room that can be utilized by other outside non-profit and profit organizations.



2024-2025 Year-In-Review



Elizabethtown College honored the Class of 2025 during the 122nd Commencement Exercises on May 10.

Elizabethtown College honored 609 graduates from six of Etown's Schools, including the School of Graduate and Professional Studies (SGPS), during its 122nd Commencement ceremony on Saturday, May 10. The outdoor ceremony in The Dell featured the traditional conferring of degrees, remarks from President Elizabeth A. Rider, Ph.D., and an inspiring address by Commencement speaker S. Dale High '63, H'93, H'25, P'86, who is Chair Emeritus for High Industries Inc. and High Real Estate Group LLC.

Etown welcomed 550 members of the Class of 2028 to campus in the fall. This new class included 505 first-year students and 45 transfer students, and is the second-largest class since 2009. The class includes seven Stamps Scholars, and 136 students were accepted into the Honors Program. The College continues to attract students from different parts of the nation and world, with members of the class representing 15 states (69% from Pennsylvania) and 11 foreign countries, including Brazil, Ethiopia, Mongolia, the Netherlands, and Zimbabwe.



More than 320 Etown students, employees, alumni, and friends served the local community during Into the Streets 125 on Oct. 19.

More than 320 Etown students, employees, alumni, and friends served the local community during the Into the Streets 125 community engagement event on Oct. 19. A special edition of the College's longstanding tradition, the 31st annual event was in celebration of Etown's 125th Anniversary. With a theme of "Jumping Into the Streets," the event featured the largest group of participants in its history, who volunteered at more than 15 nonprofit organizations

across the region. The event was hosted by Etown's Center for Community and Civic Engagement (CCCE).

Eight Criminal Justice students held 12 reentry workshops for incarcerated individuals eligible for parole at the State Correctional Institution (SCI) Camp Hill over the course of the spring semester. The workshops were designed to address significant challenges faced by recently incarcerated individuals who are transitioning back into the community.

A group of Occupational Therapy (OT) graduate students and Occupational Therapy Doctoral Capstone Coordinator Diane Martin recently partnered to assist the community organization Conestoga Valley (CV) SEEDS. A nonprofit organization in the nearby Conestoga Valley School District, CV SEEDS provides social services such as health care, housing, and education to marginalized families in the district.

2024-2025 Year-In-Review (Continued)

The Young Center for Anabaptist and Pietist Studies continues its mission of teaching, research, and public interpretation.

The Young Center was delighted to contribute to Elizabethtown College's 125th anniversary celebration in a number of ways, including actively supporting an oral history project documenting the experiences of Etown students and alumni of color. Led by College Archivist Rachel Grove Rohrbaugh, the project engaged student researchers Jordyn Dutko '26 and Kalen Tendo '27, who assisted with the interviews and dove into College yearbooks, newspapers, and archival collections. Dutko and Tendo made a public presentation of their findings to the campus in February.

The work of these students and Grove Rohrbaugh was displayed throughout the spring semester in a multimedia exhibit titled, "Preserving the Stories of Etown Students and Alumni of Color." It featured stories and photographs of early students, faculty, and staff of African American, Asian American, and Hispanic backgrounds, as well as video excerpts from interviews with alumni. The exhibit also included contributions from the Elizabethtown Church of the Brethren's Racial Justice Working Group documenting the local area's history as a "sundown town." The exhibit also displayed information on Etown's Truth, Racial Healing, and Transformation Campus Center.

In March, the Young Center's Durnbaugh Lecture featured historian John D. Roth speaking on "The Bible as a Source of Renewal in Anabaptism and Pietism." The accompanying Durnbaugh Seminar on the following day introduced the new Anabaptist Community Bible, to which dozens of Church of the Brethren congregations contributed study notes. The Young Center was pleased to partner with the Susquehanna Valley Ministry Center to offer continuing education credits for Brethren pastors who attended these events.

A ceremony and reception were held on April 11 to rededicate the Peace Tree, which was planted nearly 50 years ago on Etown's campus by Dr. Eugene P. Clemens, Professor of Religion Emeritus, and his students. More than 40 members of the campus community and the Elizabethtown College Peace Fellowship gathered to rededicate and place a new plaque at the tree near Lake Placida that commemorates all those in the Etown community who strive to keep peace alive with action.

To mark the 500th anniversary of the Anabaptist movement's beginnings in 1525, the Young Center will host a major conference on Early Anabaptism in Global Perspective from July 22 through 24. The gathering will feature more than 30 plenary sessions, research papers, seminars, and workshops by presenters from 10 countries, including current and retired Bethany Theological Seminary faculty.

This year, the Young Center again welcomed church and community groups to tour the Bowers Interpretive Gallery, which combines photos, objects, and sound to explain the central importance of peace and service in Anabaptist and Pietist traditions.







2025 Report to Church of the Brethren District Conferences

Bethany Seminary

February 1, 2025

As Bethany Theological Seminary enters its 31st year in Richmond, Indiana, we are delighted to report that our educational mission is thriving! We continue to see strong enrollment as students from the Church of the Brethren (as well as other Christian traditions) come to Bethany as they respond to a call from God to ministry and service. Thanks to strong financial support from alumni and friends, our robust academic program is affordable and accessible to all qualified students.

We have responded to the changing needs and interests of students by investing in technology that extends our learning community around the world. We regularly update courses or add new ones to help students grow spiritually and intellectually and prepare to minister and serve in a wide array of contexts. Yet the education we provide remains grounded in the enduring values and distinctive witness of the Church of the Brethren.

A review of the past decades reveals a clear trajectory as the Seminary has moved through worry about the institution's survival, completed diligent work to ensure our long term financial sustainability, and arrived at a moment where we can imagine flourishing for generations to come. The key to our success is that Bethany is a truly student-centered institution. When we put our energy and resources into providing students with a truly transformative seminary education, there is no doubt that Bethany, and our distinctive Brethren witness, will continue to shine.

Leadership

Board of Trustees

The Bethany Board of Trustees is led by Chairman Mark Clapper (Elizabethtown, Pennsylvania). Jacqueline Hartley (Elgin, Illinois) is vice chair and Jonathan Frye (McPherson, Kansas) is board secretary. New members of the board are Katy Gray Brown (North Manchester, Indiana), David McFadden (Milford, Indiana), and Dennis Webb (Evanston, Illinois).

Campus Leadership

Rev. Dr. Jeff Carter is in his 12th year as president of Bethany. He is assisted by an experienced leadership team that helps guide long-term planning and day-to-day decision making at the Seminary. This year Jeff has represented Bethany at meetings of the World Council of Churches, the Association of Theological Schools, and on visits to Nigeria. Locally, he remains engaged in the local community, working to build relationships with key

partners. Jeff continues to speak in congregations and at district and denominational events, and is working to strengthen the seminary's connection to the Brethren colleges.

Major Initiatives

The Seminary is working with the six Brethren colleges to establish a pathway for high achieving students at the colleges to earn a graduate certificate or begin work on a master's degree through Bethany while they are still undergraduates. Bethany hopes to have memoranda of understanding with all of the institutions signed within a year. The program will not only strengthen ties between the colleges and the Seminary, but also to provide undergraduates a seamless, affordable, and accessible way to pursue theological education and prepare to answer a call to various forms of ministry and service.

Bethany held its first Commencement ceremony in Jos. Nigeria on May 21, 2024. That joyous occasion honored 22 graduates who had completed postgraduate diplomas and certificates between 2021-24. The event marked an important milestone in a multiyear effort to build and nurture relationships in Nigeria. For context, Bethany signed a Memorandum of Understanding with Ekkleisiyar Yan'uwa a Nigeria (EYN) to offer an online educational program in 2016. The technology center where classes are now held was constructed in 2017. Bethany now has two full-time staff members in Jos — Sharon Flaten and Joshua Sati — who have built relationships with students, friends, and neighbors. President Jeff Carter and other Seminary leaders have traveled to Nigeria several times to meet with leaders of government offices, religious organizations, and academic institutions. We have also hosted visitors from Nigeria in Richmond. Especially notable is our connection to Rev. Dr. Daniel Mbaya, the president of EYN. He was keynote speaker at our first Nigeria commencement, and he visited our campus last summer.

Funded in part by a grant from the City of Richmond, Bethany has launched a new opportunity for leadership training and service that is open to students from all of the higher education institutions in Richmond. The Seminary has forged a new partnership with Indiana University East, which includes the opportunity for Bethany students to enroll in select courses offered at the University. These collaborations are part of Bethany's effort to deepen its connections to the local community.

At the 2024 Annual Conference, Bethany celebrated the public launch of Flourish: A Campaign for Bethany Theological Seminary. This fundraising effort seeks \$12 million to enhance the student experience, encourage faculty creativity and innovation, and to bolster the Seminary's annual fund. As of January 1, 2025, the Seminary had received 1209 gifts to the campaign and raised \$10.8 million. This total includes several leadership gifts, including \$1 million from Priscilla Wampler, and her late husband, Paul, to support the Bethany BOLD program; \$1.4 million from Kathy and Mark Melhorn in support of various needs; and an additional gift to ensure that the Seminary will continue to have a strong focus on Brethren studies. Bethany intends to complete the campaign in 2026.

Academic Community

The Seminary continues to offer four master's degrees, as well as nine programs leading to graduate certificates or postgraduate diplomas. All courses are accessible to students from anywhere in the world via an internet connection. Bethany offers students many opportunities to put their faith and education into practice through community engagement and service learning activities. Some intensive courses continue to be offered far from campus in such locations as Atlanta, Los Angeles, and Iona, Scotland.

Selected Faculty Activities

Dr. Jeff Carter led a continuing education event for pastors at the Idaho/Western Montana District Conference. He was also a presenter at the Susquehanna Valley Ministry Center's day-long fall symposium. His presentation was entitled, "The Question of Leadership: Why It Matters!" In addition, Carter was a presenter and closing speaker at the Church of the Brethren LEAD Conference hosted by the Ephrata Church of the Brethren. He also recently published an essay in In Trust magazine discussing Bethany's commitment to forming community in person and with technology.

Dr. Joelle Hathaway presented at the American Academy of Religion on "A New Icon of The Triumph of Orthodoxy" in a pedagogy section called "Teach This Image." She also published a visual curation and commentary for The Visual Commentary on Scripture titled, "Discerning the Body." One image each from artists Graeme Mortimer Evelyn, Nyoman Darsane, and Susan Dorothea White were put into conversation with 1 Corinthians 11:17-33 to consider what it means "to come together" as a Church in today's world. These three contemporary works were chosen as small windows into the pressing issues of global poverty, gender discrimination, and ethnic and racial oppression. Read in light of Paul's concerns for the celebration of the Lord's Supper, these images invite us to consider various challenges to the unity of the body of Christ. At the December 2023 meeting of the Academy of Homiletics, Dr. Dawn Ottoni-Wilhelm, Brightbill professor of preaching and worship and editor of the journal Homiletic, gave a panel presentation on publication trends in the field of homiletics, along with editors of the International Journal of Homiletics, Westminster John Knox Press, and Rowan and Littlefield.

Dr. Denise Kettering-Lane, associate professor of Brethren studies, presented papers at two conferences last fall. In September, she presented "Lessons from the Past for 21st-Century Brethren" at The Forum for Brethren Studies at Bridgewater College. She shared "The Krefeld Connection: Pietists and Immigration to Germantown, Pennsylvania" at the Heirs of Pietism II Conference held at United Theological Seminary in October.

Dr. Steve Schweitzer, academic dean, published "Introduction and Biblical Context Notes" on 1-2 Chronicles in Anabaptist Community Bible. Harrisonburg, VA: MennoMedia, 2025. Schweitzer presented a paper: "Proximity to an Elusive Utopia in Deuteronomy: How the

Book Presents Its Vision as Accessible but Not Realized" at the Utopian Studies Consultation, national annual meeting of the Society of Biblical Literature, in San Antonio, Texas. He also led a Continuing Education Unit event for Susquehanna Valley Ministry Center titled "Choose Life: Deuteronomy's Message."

Dr. Dan Ulrich, Wieand professor of New Testament studies, published commentaries about Hebrews 1:1-12 and Hebrews 10:5-10 at workingpreacher.org. Both passages appear this year in the Revised Common Lectionary.


