Trusting God When You're Trapped in Uncertainty

Recently, the Nurture Commission held a meeting with the major portion of the evening's business focused on the beginnings of the budgeting process for 2025. If you have ever taken part in budget creation, you know this is a task that is very rarely an easy one. This year, I felt even more uncertain about submitting a budget with the uncertainty surrounding the district - its membership and its leadership, specifically the District Executive role being up in the air. For this meeting, I was scheduled to lead the devotion. As I thought and prayed about a devotion that would be relevant and impactful, my mind kept returning to that feeling of uncertainty. Shortly thereafter, God provided the perfect devotional for myself, and the other members of that commission on that very topic: uncertainty. In true God fashion, this devotion was very impactful to the persons on the Nurture Commission and we felt it needed to be shared with each of you. The devotion is titled "Trusting God When You're Trapped in Uncertainty" and was written by Daniel Henderson. May God bless you as you read.

I used to say that we live in uncertain times. While I still believe this is true, I am starting to conclude that we all live uncertain lives. While God's truth and our eternal destiny in Christ are certain, many other factors in our lives are a bit unpredictable and unclear at times. It is the nature of the journey.

I suppose today as you read this you face some measure of uncertainty. You may face major questions about your health, your job, your finances, your children, your grand-children, your church, or someone in your circle of friends. Clearly, we cannot avoid uncertainty in this life, but we can respond to it in a Christ-honoring and soul-profiting fashion.

Recently I read a profound interchange documented in a book by the renowned ethicist John Kavanaugh. He tells of a time in his life when he went to Calcutta to work for three months at "The House of the Dying". This experience was part of his heartfelt search for direction about his future. The first morning there, he met Mother Teresa. She asked, "And what can I do for you?" Kavanaugh asked her to pray for him.

"What do you want me to pray for?" she asked. He responded by explaining that he had come thousands of miles from the U.S. to find direction: "Pray that I have clarity."

She said firmly, "No, I will not do that." When asked why, she said, "Clarity is the last thing you are clinging to and must let go of." Kavanaugh commented that she always seemed to have the clarity he longed for. She laughed and said, "I have never had clarity; what I have always had is trust. So I will pray that you trust God."

There is something in all of us that always wants clarity. It is part of our sinful ego and a common expression of our insecurities. Clarity can become an idol that replaces authentic trust in God. In many ways, we would rather understand the details of the road ahead than rest in deep intimacy with the God who has promised to direct our steps. He has never promised to show us a detailed 10-year plan. Clarity can actually become spiritually counterproductive as it shortchanges trust, a life of faith, and moment-by-moment dependence on God.

Scripture tells us, "Trust in Him at all times, you people; Pour out your heart before Him; God is a refuge for us" (Psalm 62:8). Yes, we must pour out our hearts and all they contain – praise, gratitude, worry, fear, doubt, and, yes, uncertainty. God is our in-the-moment refuge, but not always a divine GPS system, spouting the details of every turn we might encounter one year down the road. Thus, we must trust Him at ALL times. We should never assume a life of trust or take God's refuge for granted.


GOD'S WISDOM as given to us in His WORD

MEAT CANNING 2024 HATCHED OUT SUCCESSFULLY!

THE 2024 DISTRICT MEAT CANNING PROJECT, ACCOMPLISHED IN PARTNERSHIP WITH THE MID-ATLANTIC DISTRICT TOOK PLACE APRIL 1-4, 2024, AT THE CHRISTIAN AID MINISTRY FACILITY IN EPHRATA, LANCASTER COUNTY. WITH APPROXIMATELY 139 VOLUNTEERS FROM BOTH MID-ATLANTIC AND SOPA DISTRICT CONGREGATIONS, APPROXIMATELY 17,920 LBS OF CHICKEN WAS CANNED, RESULTING IN OVER 9000 PLUS, TWENTY OZ CANS.

As in the past 46 years volunteers from both Districts have enjoyed community with one another knowing the time spent together on this mission project would be much similar to the statement in the bible about sharing a cup of cold water. This year, as in past years, the canned meat has been divided three ways. Both Districts receive 1/3 of the canned chicken to distribute within their Districts to agencies and to individuals to help with putting food on their table. Also, this year a third of this canned project will make its way to the west coast where Gilbert Romero will be able to help those in neighboring areas who, many times, find themselves scavenging for food at the local dump. Things we often take for granted.

Community Outreach within our District

General tips: 1. ring cameras for homes, 2. carrying pepper spray, 3. not leaving your purse in the car when shopping, and 4. disposing of unused drugs at the municipal building / police station, and 5. recycling batteries/ wornout rechargeable batteries, where appropriately recycled. We handed out invitations to attendees for the weekly community Lenten Luncheons and our WSCOB Easter services.
- Mechanicsburg COB packs and sends care boxes for their college students. Boxes contain items like treats and sweet goodies. Recently, the church added computer bags to the boxes that included a special note to each student.
- Mechanicsburg COB hosts **Burgers & Dogs Community Cookouts**, last Saturday of the month, May—September, 12-2. Members of the congregation and the community are encouraged to attend.

Park Chaplaincy Program

This is to remind you that the Nurture Commission works with the Leisure Ministry and the Park Chaplaincy programs through the PA Council of Churches. This is a program that has been going on for over 60 years and is the only one of its kind in the country. Each year it was graciously hosted by the Mechanicsburg COB and always featured a delicious hot breakfast and several inspirational sessions led by guest speakers on topics of interest to men. For many years it was well attended, but in recent years participation began to dwindle. The Nurture Commission decided to change the venue in an effort to spark some new interest.

When the SOPA Nurture Commission approached Camp Eder to explore co-sponsoring a Men's Outdoorsman Day the idea was met with enthusiasm from Mike Kovacs and Denny Turner. (The cost to participate in a clay pigeon shoot, would normally cost much more than this.)

To start the day, a frequent volunteer at Camp Eder, known to campers as Coach K, shared an inspiring devotional time featuring "Putting on the Whole Armor of God" from Ephesians 6. The spirit of the day was filled with enthusiasm, good fellowship, and relationship building. Just so you know, no live pigeons were harmed and all the fish caught were gently released back into the lake.


Invite us to your church to hear more of our message. You will be surprised! And Inspired! We spoke at over 15 churches last year.

When we taught our first homeschool group I told a story about a poisonous snake, the threat of it biting you, and asked why would we want to mess with it. We compared it to when we mess with drugs like alcohol. We asked for their observations. A wise ten-year-old said "you know, snakes are snakes. They do what is natural. Poison is what they give when they bite. It goes into you because you messed with them. But you are the one that decides to put alcohol or any other drug into your body. That's on you."

We've been teaching at quite a few schools! We taught 265 classes and over 5,000 kids last year. Our goal is to do more in 2024.

In the Shadow

The Wonder of It All

It is now late Spring in south-central Pennsylvania (in Burundi and Rwanda it seems to be always Spring). The grass here is green, the neighbors have finished up planting corn and beans, my sons and I are getting into hay-making and the slugs are eating most anything they can get their little chompers on. God's creative work is evident in it all, yet I so often take it for granted and play hookey from the everyday worship service I should be conducting (even if I am the only one in attendance).

Most of us church-goers have heard at one time or another the defensive remark, "I don't need to be in church, I can worship God while I'm _____ (fill in the blank)." This comment of course is ignoring the need for corporate worship, prayer and fellowship, as well as the simple fact that most of these folks are not actively worshipping when they're out and about. I'll not get into that today, rather to tackle another significant lack that the outdoorzees have, which is that a person simply cannot gain theological and doctrinal

knowledge from deer hunting or star gazing.

The Bible says that God's "eternal power and divine nature have been clearly perceived ever since the creation of the world." (*Romans 1:20 ESV*) But as much as nature exhibits the power, glory and majesty of the Divine, it will not expound to us the finer points of who God is. There is indeed a general revelation of God from the natural world and it is possible that while pondering some of nature's more brutal aspects (ie: earthquakes, volcanoes, weather extremes, varmints destroying farm and garden crops, cats terrorizing goldfinches) one might perceive the need for a Savior or some sort of redemptive activity that could only be carried out by someone outside of the human order. But sitting on a rocky outcropping watching

the sun rise or set can't explain the trinitarian existence of God or the blood atonement first revealed in Genesis and fully realized in Jesus Christ. C. S. Lewis wrote:

"Nature never taught me that there exists a God of glory and of infinite majesty. I had to learn that in other ways. But nature gave the word glory a meaning for me. I still do not know where else I could have found one. I do not see how "fear" of God could have ever meant to me anything but the lowest prudential efforts to be safe, if I had never seen certain ominous ravines and unapproachable crags. And if nature had never awakened certain longings in me, huge areas of what I can now mean by "love" of God would never, so far as I can see, have existed." C. S. Lewis, *The Four Loves*.

Nature is a fantastic teacher, in the realm of what it can teach. The study of the sciences point us dramatically to an omnipotent, omnipresent and omniscient Creator (providing the student has his or her eyes, ears and heart open to it). But if we skip out on the church's biblical teachings, be it from worship, singing the great hymns, preaching, Bible study, etc, the universe just doesn't make a whole lot of sense, let alone our being able to have any significant understanding of who God is, to grasp any meaning for our existence, to point us to the cross or – to use another omni word – God's omnibenevolence.

By the same token, if we have no appreciation for the created order of the universe, we won't catch the glory of God. I am awed by what God accomplishes on a daily basis. The billions of stars that fill the heavens. The billions of people that inhabit the earth. The billions of microscopic organisms that inhabit the soil under my feet. Really, I should be removing my shoes. I'm standing on holy ground.
