"Cherish the Moment"

As we enter a new year with its challenges, possibilities, and hopes, this piece by Robert J. Hastings entitled "The Station" is a reminder that life is meant to be lived TODAY--not tomorrow or some distant time in the future, but right now! Here's Mr. Hastings' article, followed by some thoughts of my own:

TUCKED AWAY IN OUR SUBCONSCIOUS MINDS is an idyllic vision in which we see ourselves on a long journey spanning an entire continent. We're traveling by train, and from the windows, we drink in the passing scenes of cars on nearby highways, children waving at crossings, cattle grazing in distant pastures, smoke pouring from factories, row upon row of cotton and corn and wheat, mountains and valleys, city skylines and village halls.

But uppermost in our conscious minds is our final destination—that time when on at a certain hour and on a given day, our train will finally pull into the station with bells ringing, flags waving, and bands playing. For the believer, once that day comes—the beginning of eternity with the Lord-many wonderful dreams will come true. Restlessly, we pace the aisles and count the miles, peering ahead, waiting and for the station.

But in the meantime, there's a "station" we look forward to here on earth. "Yes, when we reach the station, that will be it!" we promise ourselves. "When we're 18... when we win that promotion... put the last kid through college... buy that Mercedes-Benz... paid off the mortgage... have a nest egg for retirement." We like to imagine that from that day on, we will all live happily ever after.

Sooner or later, however, we must realize there IS no station in this life--no one earthly place to arrive at once and for all. The joy is in the journey. The station is an illusion--it constantly out-distances us. Yesterday is a memory, tomorrow is a dream. Yesterday belongs to history, tomorrow belongs to God. Yesterday is a fading sunset, tomorrow is a faint sunrise. Only today is there light enough to love and live.

So gently close the door on yesterday and throw the key away. It isn't the burdens of today that drive people mad, as much as regret over yesterday and fear of tomorrow. Regret and fear are twin thieves who would rob us of today. "Relish the moment" is a good motto, especially when coupled with Psalm 118:24, "This is the day which the Lord hath made; we will rejoice and be glad in it."

So stop pacing the aisles and counting the miles. Instead, swim more rivers, climb more mountains, kiss more babies, count more stars. Laugh more. Go barefoot more often. Eat more ice cream. Ride more merry-go-rounds. Watch more sunsets. Life must be lived as we go along. So cherish the journey! The station will come soon enough.

"Cherish the Moment" Continued

Years ago when all of our children were still at home, one of the songs our family sang together at various services and programs was "Cherish the Moment." The theme was that children grow up quickly, and we need to make the most of our time with them while we have the opportunity.

How true that song is! I have found myself thinking recently how nice it would be to be able to go back and re-live certain "slices" of life--brief moments of time such as when I would walk into the house, and our youngest child at the time would come toddling up to me for a hug. Or being awakened from my Sunday afternoon nap by a 5-year-old pulling a little table up to the couch and arranging a puzzle for us to do together. Or one of the concerts in which our now "Doctor of Musical Arts" daughter received thunderous applause for her flute solo part in a piece. Thankfully, we can at least re-live those kinds of moments in our memory.

But I have to ask myself – what am I doing with the moments and opportunities I have right now? Am I content to live just in the memories of the past, or am I fully present in the moments that make up life today? Do I often find myself wishing away the hours and days till I get past whatever obstacle or responsibility I happen to be dealing with? While it's not wrong to have goals--to look ahead to some "station" we're aiming for--we miss out on so much by failing to be present in the moment.

No doubt we all have some regrets over missed opportunities, or sadness because some of "the ways things used to be" are not that way anymore. But what about appreciating and making the most of whatever blessings we have NOW? "Cherishing the moment" is something I have often failed to put into practice. I'm always thinking of that "thing I need to do next" after I finish whatever I happen to be working on or involved in now. But as Mr. Hastings reminds us, "The joy is in the journey"... "life must be lived as we go along"... "only today is there light enough to love and live."

As we embark upon a new year, how thankful we can be to the Lord for His faithfulness and His blessings bestowed upon us up to this point. And thanks be to God for whatever He has in store for us not only this YEAR, but this MOMENT, TODAY! THIS is the day the Lord has made! May we pray the prayer of Moses found in Psalm 90 - "Teach us to number our days, that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom."

CONSIDER WHO YOUR NEIGHBOR IS AND REACH OUT TO THEM

As I have taken some quiet time to read some of our congregation's church newsletters, I applaud the numerous varying kinds of outreach happening. As we have just come through the Season of ADVENT, I noticed an air of excitement about the season the church celebrates and reminds us of the real meaning of the of Christmas. It is a season of excitement for the small ones and a time of bringing family and friends home together, BUT WHAT ABOUT THE HARD TIMES in life's journey that crowds out the excitement of the season? If your spouse is still with you, are you thankful? If you have given God praise for that gift, think of those persons whose life partner is no longer beside them. There are many other situations where Christmas does not always carry all the joy and thanksgiving others are experiencing.

For many, Christmas is not "the most wonderful time of the year!" (The following was shared in the Mechanicsburg Newsletter regarding this special service)...."The idea behind the Blue Christmas Service is to create space for the acknowledgement of the heaviness often carried during this season, as well as offering the hope that Jesus gives. Our society has become one of masking emotions that are sometimes considered negative. The Bible clearly acknowledges, celebrates, and makes space for pain, struggle, hardship, and tears —and so should we....The Blue Christmas Service is a beautiful way to make space especially during the Advent season for those suffering any kind of loss—whether the loss of a person, a dream, finances, stability, health, or more."

Another special service I am aware that a couple of our congregations provide for their congregants and persons in the neighborhood is a special service many times held around "All Saint's Day". The Congregational leader invites congregants to attend and provide a photograph of their departed loved one. Also a computer- generated photo presentation of departed loved ones, can be utilized. As each photograph is acknowledged, a bell is chimed as the departed loved one's name is called out. A brief time of sharing about the purpose of our journey here on earth is shared which may be for some unchuched persons the first time they have had the opportunity to hear about God's desire for us during this earthly journey.

These two special services seem to be a helpful way to reach out to those who have lost a loved one or who carries the heavy news of a health concern, as well as letting someone who does not know God's Peace know, you, the neighborhood church family care.

(Feel Free to send the District Office outreach ministry which your congregation is doing to reach the unchurched as well as those in the congregation who are not as in tune to God's invitation to be a part of HIS family.)



Course Description:

Within our local communities, we can often find those from "every tribe and tongue," which means we are called to serve those who increasingly reflect a wide range of backgrounds and experiences. How can local churches welcome different people, moving toward achieving the multicultural vision found in Revelation 7:9 of those from every tribe and tongue worshipping God together? This short course explores what it means to be interculturally competent today. It equips pastors and leaders with the skills, knowledge, and insights needed to engage with and minister to our diverse neighbors. Through assigned readings, class discussions and activities, and some online work, we will delve into how to build relationships across differences as Christ calls us to be "one body." As part of this course, students will develop an action plan applying key concepts around intercultural competence within their contexts. No background in intercultural studies is required, though an openness to learning and a commitment to fostering inclusivity are essential.

Course Objectives:

- Understanding Cultural Dynamics: Explore foundational concepts of culture and intercultural communication, including how cultural values, beliefs, and practices shape experiences and interactions.
- Building Cultural Awareness: Develop an awareness of one's own cultural lens and perspectives while learning to recognize and appreciate the cultural dimensions of others within the community.
- Developing Intercultural Competence Strategies: Gain practical skills in intercultural competence to foster meaningful and respectful dialogue, manage conflicts, and build inclusive environments within the church and beyond.

Travel Grant:

The Brethren Academy will provide a travel stipend of up to \$300 for 8 pastors or church leaders who register for this course. The stipend is to offset travel costs, reimbursement upon submission of travel receipts. To qualify for a travel grant, individuals must be currently and actively serving a congregation. Course Description

This course will focus on transformational and servant leadership. When the Body of Christ is struggling for effective life and mission in a world needing Good News, it calls for creative thinking that is outside the box of the usual. Change is difficult for any system and requires special insights and skills to prepare an organization for another way of living and practicing mission. The leader must be transformed as well as the church system. Michael Frost and Alan Hirsch in ReJesus invite their readers to understand transformational leaders as focusing on Christology that will inform the character of ecclesiology and then clarify missiology.

Course Objectives

- Clarification about leadership and congregational transformation from a movement perspective and why each is important.
- Gaining insights about servant and transformational leadership styles that speak to
 effectiveness for this time.
- Gaining a renewed commitment and important insights to make Christ the focus and
 the body of Christ the emphasis for practicing vital and effective mission in the
 neighborhoods of our unique congregations (emphasis and practice of the life and
 teaching of Jesus with the spirit of the living Christ guiding our journey to faithful
 missional practices).
- Addressing why pietism and anabaptism practices are relevant to growing the Kingdom of God with today's generational challenges.
- Learning three key elements of an effective body of Christ.
- Expand and practice learned understandings of how to read a congregation's life-cycle.
- Developing learning skills to be Christ in the neighborhood.
- Learning practices for reading congregational and community culture and how to work at creating a missional culture.
- Envisioning evangelism from the perspective of growing the Kingdom of God.
- Learning to manage conflict that arises in a transformational process.

Randy Yoder has served as a pastor, District Executive in Middle PA, and church coach. He also has served on the General Board (prior to it being known as the Ministry and Mission Board) and was an independent staff person for Brethren Benefit Trust as a specialist in long-term care insurance. He has served as Interim District Executive for Atlantic Northeast and Western Plains Districts, and Interim Pastor at Oakton Church of the Brethren in Mid-Atlantic District.  Early Anabaptism in Global Perspective -- Past, Present, and Future at 500 Years July 22-24, 2025

This conference marking the 500th anniversary of the birth of the Anabaptist movement will revisit early Anabaptism and give special attention to the global context in which it emerged and spread. Speakers will also consider how Anabaptist history has been received by churches and academics in more recent times and in varying contexts around the world. With more than three dozen plenary sessions, papers, seminars, and roundtables by presenters from ten countries, the conference will examine such varied themes as migration, diplomacy, the arts, colonialism, peacemaking, and theological identity. Explorations of the connections between Anabaptism and Baptist, Hutterite, Liberation Theology, Quaker, Mennonite, and Radical Pietist traditions are also on the program. Roundtable sessions and seminars include a discussion of approaches to teaching early Anabaptism and a workshop on reading early Anabaptist sources in community. Optional pre- and post-conference field trips will visit area libraries and archives and the 1719 Museum.

Children's Aid Society has been selected through a competitive application process to host and administer the Youth Court Alliance of York County, the program previously under the


